Report of the Board of Managers.

The Now begins the sixty-fifth year of our Society with an everfield. increasing opportunity for useful and friendly work among
the seafarers of this port. For a detailed statement of the
work done, we invite your attention to the summary following this report,
and the synopsis of the reports of the various branches and stations maintained by the Society.

The We give religious privileges, rational entertainment and Work. friendly greeting, police and social protection, and aid in the legal protection of seamen. Our reading rooms and our banking department encourage them to write to their families and to supply them with funds, which they have deposited with us for safekeeping and for transmission to the extent of \$116,665.57 this year, and to the aggregate amount of \$530,137.09 in the last five years.

Appropriate action has been taken on 291 claims of seamen whom we have referred to the Legal Aid Society, to which we have for several years made an annual contribution of \$250 in recognition of such service. 5,741 have attended our entertainments, and 22,449 have been present at our religious services during the current year.

The success of the "Home" in Brooklyn, "The Breakwater," has exceeded our expectations. It is located at the corner of Furman Street and Atlantic Avenue and has been adequately equipped for the accommodation of 100 men who seek a wholesome and safe lodging. This building must serve our purpose until the proposed new sailors' home in South Street is completed, when we expect to furnish room and board to 500 seamen.

As we said last year: "This is a problem and a responsibility greater than has ever before been assumed by our Society; but it is the natural and logical development of our work. It is not too much to hope that New York, the first port of our country, will set an example to other ports. The commercial, maritime and civic interests of this magnificent metropolis, which leads the world in its generous and humane interest in men who labor and suffer on land, will not fail to complete this monumental work in aid of those who toil and perish on the sea. And we renew our appeal to all who are interested in this plan for the welfare of the sailor to send their subscription in aid of the new building to the Chairman of the Building Committee, Edmund L. Baylies, 54 Wall Street, N. Y. City."

Owing to the unexpected delay in obtaining the needed funds during the period of financial depression we shall not be able for another year to consolidate our scattered stations in the new building, and must therefore renew our lease for the premises known as the Battery Station at Nos. 1 and 2 State Street.

Our Free The number of seamen shipped without payment of il-Shipping legal shipping fees and bonuses during the year from our Bureau. Battery Station was 2,001, and from our North River Station 377, making a total of 2,378, while the Battery Station provided employment on ships to 952 men and the North River Station to 277 more, making a grand total of 1,229. By our protection and hospitality extended to the sailor on shore we have constantly lessened the criminal traffic in human beings by the crimps and sailors' boardinghouse keepers. An estimated 203,653 visits have been made to our reading rooms and Sailors' Home and many of these men desired shipment. This has been availed of to an increasing extent by many captains seeking for crews, and our new department supplies the United States Naval Auxiliary Service which now ships its men in this port wholly from our Battery Station.

Institute Our harbor boat "Sentinel" continues to add greatly to the efficiency of our Institute work by the transportation of 2,001 and seamen, from ship to shore, from the harbor to hospitals, and Harbor for religious services at our floating church. It has made 399 Service. trips and has visited 1,157 ships during the current year.

The Seamen's Benefit Society continues to aid us in keeping the vessel in commission by its sympathy and by its contribution this year of \$600 toward its annual cost of \$5,855,89.

The amount of two thousand dollars has been received for the Mary LeRoy King Boat Endowment Fund from Mrs. Louis B. McCagg, a sister of the late Miss King.

Legislation. Our Committee on Legislation has been successful in promoting protection for men employed on scows and barges and revision of our navigation laws so as to secure the general use of life-saving appliances on all classes of vessels, and particularly in shortening the dangerous lengths of tow lines in the harbors and waters of the United States,

In The death of the Right Rev. Henry C. Potter, D.D., L.L.D. Memoriam. has deprived our Society of its greatly beloved President at a time when his loss cannot be sufficiently deplored. During his long connection with the Society and its Board of Managers his unflagging sympathy and never failing interest in our work will cause his memory to be cherished while the Society endures.


We have also suffered an irreparable loss by the death of one of our

Vice-Presidents, Rev. Morgan Dix, D.D., S.T.D., D.C.L. Although unable to attend the meetings of the Board and of the Society, he showed his great interest in our work by his counsel and sympathy, and by the annual stipend of One thousand dollars granted by the Trinity Church Corporation which has been and is a constant source of encouragement and support. His long-continued membership in our Society was ever a cause for gratitude.

Legacy. The Society has been encouraged this year by a legacy of \$5000 from the estate of the late Winfield Tucker, and of \$1,000 from the estate of the late Johanna H. H. TenBroeck.

We have been compelled to draw again from our trust funds \$6,075.25 We have faith to believe that this work for seamen will find new friends in each generation while the need exists. We have nailed our flag to the mast, and we shall man the pumps so long as we can keep above water.



Report of the Committee on Legislation.

Your Committee is glad to report that the desired legislation in behalf of men employed on scows and barges, to which reference was made in our last year's report, was duly enacted by Congress and approved by the President May 28, 1908. A Commission was also appointed by the President to revise the United States navigation laws so as to provide greater security for life at sea.

A Commission appointed by Congress at the same session to regulate the length of tow lines has reported in favor of restricting such tow lines to a maximum length of 2,000 feet, and that limit has been fixed by the Government. Heretofore tow lines at sea have extended from 2,000 to 10,000 feet in length, greatly adding to the danger of collision with passenger and other vessels and to the loss of scows and barges and their crews in heavy weather.

The several Committees and Commissions appointed to give hearings on these matters invited your Committee to attend and to express its views. Your Committee was represented at these hearings both in Washington and New York, and it is entirely satisfied with the results obtained and which are now in force.

Further legislation may be expected along similar lines, and particularly in requiring the Captain and mates of vessels of 100 tons and upwards to be licensed. The law as it now stands requires licensed officers only on board sailing vessels of 700 tons and upwards. Your Committee feels sure that many disasters may be avoided by bringing the smaller vessels within the requirements of the license law.

Extract from the new statute and regulations are given below.

"Each such scow or boat shall be equipped at all times with a life line or rope extending at least the length of and three feet above the deck thereof, such rope to be attached to the coaming thereof, also with a life preserver and a life buoy for each person on board thereof, also with an anchor to weigh not less than 275 pounds and at least 100 feet of cable attached thereto; a list of the names of all men employed on any such scow or boat shall be kept by the owner or master thereof, and the said list shall be open to the inspection of all parties. Failure to comply with any of the foregoing provisions shall render the owner of such scow or boat liable upon conviction thereof to a penalty of not more than \$500.

That on and after January 1, 1909:

- § 10. The local inspectors of steamboats shall at least once in every year inspect the hull and equipment of every sea-going barge of 100 gross tons or over, and shall satisfy themselves that such barge is of a structure suitable for the service in which she is to be employed, has suitable accommodation for the crew, and is in condition to warrant the belief that she may be used in navigation with safety to life.
- § 11. That every such barge shall be equipped with the following appliances of kinds approved by the Board of Supervising Inspectors: at least one life boat, at least one anchor with suitable chain or cable, and at least one life preserver for each person on board.

THE BREAKWATER-Home For Seamen.

In making the 54th annual report of the "Home," a brief historical sketch may be interesting.

As early as 1848 Chaplain D. V. M. Johnson suggested that a sailors' home be provided. In 1850 the "Mariners' Home" in Greenwich Street was established as a private enterprise of the Chaplain and a few members of the Board of Managers associated with him, but it did not come within the

office or duties of the Society itself.

In order to give more effect to this branch of Christian intervention for seamen, the Society in 1854 procured the passage of a law authorizing it to establish and maintain "Homes for Seamen," and the Constitution of the Society was so amended as to include this additional work. The Board made choice of a house on Franklin Square, 338 Pearl Street, and the "New Sailors' Home," as it was named, was opened in October, 1854, and the former "Mariners' Home" closed at the same time.

On May 1st, 1893, an advantageous offer having been made for the Pearl Street property, this house was sold and the "New Sailors' Home" at 52

Market Street was occupied by the Society on January 2nd, 1894.

In furtherance of plans for extension and consolidation, the Market Street building was disposed of in December, 1907, and in January, 1908, the Breakwater, our present "Home" at Nos. 17-19-21 Atlantic Avenue, Brooklyn, was opened, adequate for the accommodation of 100 men, located in a district largely frequented by seamen. The building is equipped with

steam heat, electric lights, shower and tub baths.

The men are supplied with separate sleeping rooms, a restaurant supplying single meals or board by day or week, reading, writing, recreation and baggage rooms, banking and post-office departments. Those patronizing the Breakwater are given the first opportunity to secure employment through our free shipping bureau at No. 1 State Street, Borough of Manhattan. We have continued to persevere against all the opposition of the "crimps" and "land sharks" and we have to-day less difficulty than ever before in shipping men, and have reason to be much encouraged. During the last year we have furnished employment to nearly 4,000 men, none of whom, to our knowledge, has paid one cent of compensation for shipment, or blood money. Under the new management, which went into effect with the present order of things, your Committee is satisfied with what has thus far been accomplished, and the seamen, who fully appreciate the changed conditions, have frequently expressed themselves to that effect.


The "Home" feature of our work is one of the very essential means adopted by the Society to improve the condition of seamen. It is not intended as a place where men will receive gratuitous board and lodging, but where they shall pay as at any other boarding house or hotel. Our object, however, is to see to it that, in so far as possible, the men are brought in contact with moral and religious influences and shielded from temptations.

We are trying to have every portion of the building kept scrupulously clean. It is kept well-ventilated, and the men are served with excellent meals, comfortable beds, and treated with the utmost kindness and consideration. Here we have every means and facilities for caring for the shipwrecked and destitute.

The following are some of the statistics of the work, covering practically

a period of ten months:

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

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
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
