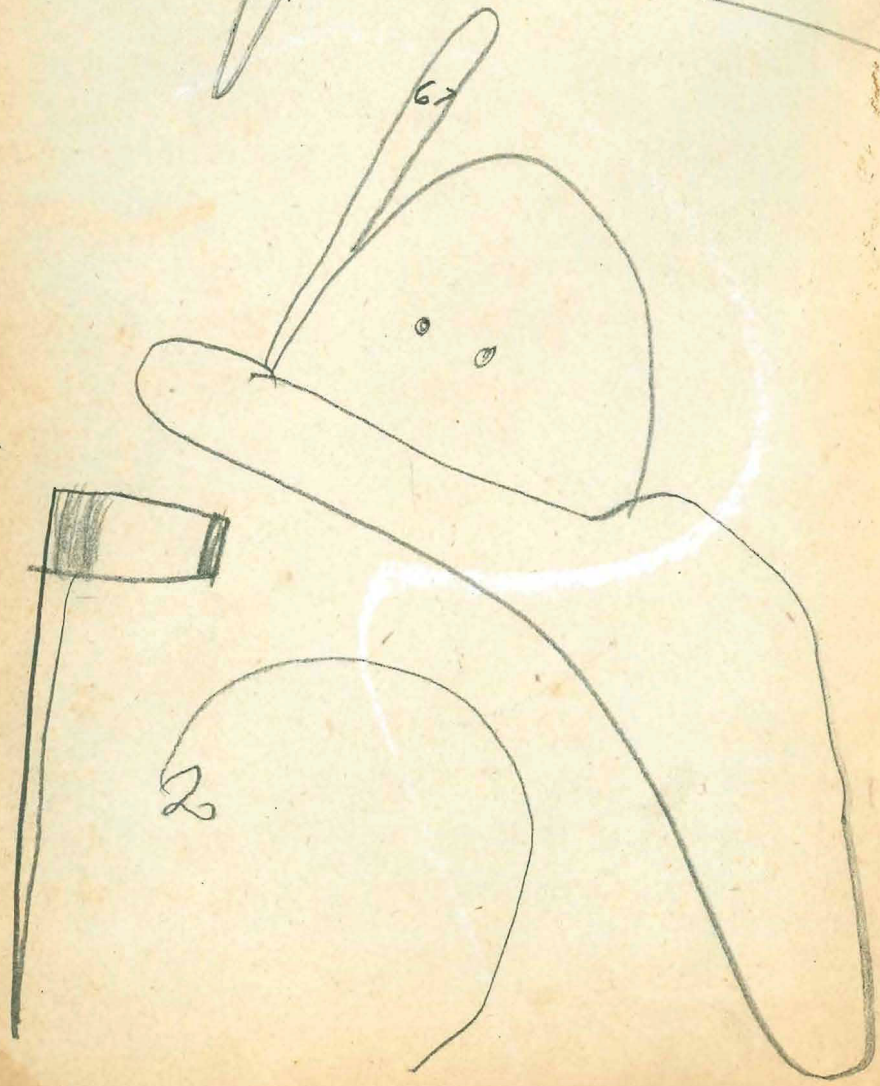

It is worthy of note that the services are becoming more generally appreciated by Sailors & Boatmen, and by parties who may be passing during the time of service

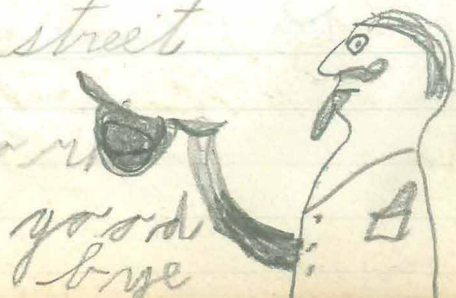

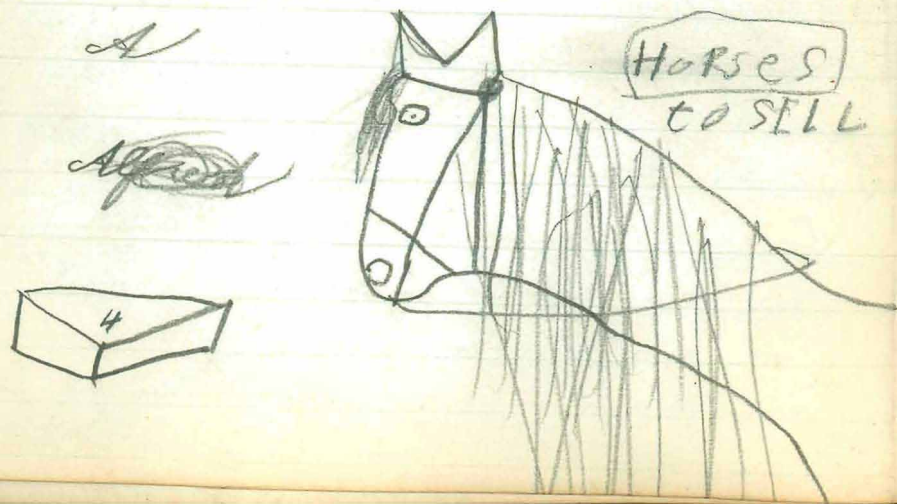
