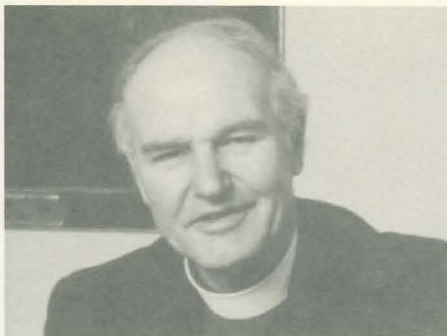

Eight years ago, I quoted in my Annual Report from Herman Melville's *Moby Dick*, "The world's a ship on its passage and not a voyage complete." I then added, "I look back with romantic nostalgia to our floating chapel, but as Melville's metaphor reminds us, 'We are still in passage, we are underway, but given the uncertainties of our time the way is not entirely clear.'"

Those were dark and difficult days for the maritime industry and the Institute. I suggested that we needed to place our confidence in a God of

hope, and not fear what lies ahead.

We have come a long way from those troubled times when the very survival of the Institute was at stake. I am happy to report that this past year has been one of major achievements which give great promise to the future. The God of hope now allows us to say, "Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say Rejoice."

The renovation and enlargement of the International Seafarers' Center at Port Newark, New Jersey, completed last fall, establishes the Center as the best seafarers' facility available anywhere. It would not have happened without the wholehearted support and enthusiasm of our President, Chip Loomis, our officers, particularly Caroline Macomber and the Development Committee and all of the members of the Board of Managers, and our Maritime, Corporate, and Foundation friends who raised almost \$2 million for the project. At the dedication ceremony in September Board member Lillian Liburdi, Director of the Port Authority of New York and

New Jersey's Port Department, generously described the Seamen's Church Institute as not only the finest agency of its kind in any port of the world, but at the very soul of the Port of New York and New Jersey.

We have a splendid program emanating from this Center. With the help of the Henry Luce Foundation and our new Asian-North American Pastoral Training Program, we have assembled the largest team of Asian chaplains in the world, augmented by non-Asian chaplains, one of whom is fluent in Mandarin. This program allows us to meet, more adequately, the needs of today's merchant seafarers, three quarters of whom are Asian. We cover the waterfront and we do it superbly. The seafarers of the world know that we care and care deeply about their welfare.

In Maritime Training we have made a quantum leap forward. With the installation of a state of the art visual system to our shiphandling simulator we have moved to the very forefront of simulation training in our nation. This comes at a time when this kind of training is desperately needed. The heads of all the major American tanker fleets have visited our New York Maritime Education Center, and Mobil and Exxon have already participated in our training programs.

The Seamen's Church Institute is ideally positioned to make a contribution to safety at sea and the protection of our marine environment, not only because of our equipment and reputation, but even more importantly, because of the high competence and experience of our dedicated training staff.

Six years ago we talked about the need for a well located, highly functional, New York Center to give visibility and public awareness to our work. How much this is needed! I attended a large church dinner in Manhattan recently and several people told me they believed the Institute had gone out of business!

Our new Center on Water Street, to be completed this year, is going to give us the kind of visibility which will attract attention to the work that we do for the seafarers and the maritime community both in this port and around the world.*

This building, however, is expensive; far more so than we anticipated. The heavy operational start-up costs for Port Newark and the bridge simulator have given us a substantial annual

Lastly, our wonderful Christmas-at-Sea program, for the second year running, broke the record of preparing, packing and distributing over ten thousand Christmas boxes for seafarers at sea on Christmas Day. The touching letters of gratitude continue to flow in. We are grateful for the dedication and diligence of the Institute's own "thousand points of light", the hundreds of volunteers all over the United States, who make this incredible feat possible.

Melville tells us that "The world is a ship on its passage and not a voyage complete." The Institute can look back at the wake, and see from whence we have come. We can look forward, con-

operating deficit this past year. Fortunately, our income from endowment in 1989 can largely offset these deficits, but this will not be true in 1990 and beyond when major portions of endowment will be invested in the Water Street Center.

We have before us the opportunity, indeed the responsibility, to offer significant memorial and gift opportunities in this striking and beautiful new facility. It is well to remember that the great building at 25 South Street which opened in 1913 was built and equipped in precisely this same manner. I am confident that there are friends of the Institute who would like to participate directly in this great building enterprise which in turn will help to preserve our endowment and ensure the financial stability of the Institute, making it possible for us to continue our mission of service to the maritime community.

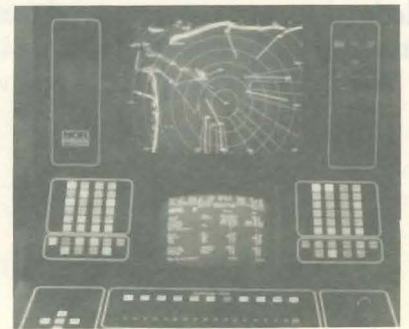
I am happy to report that I have just received our first unsolicited gift of \$25,000 from a devoted Board member to establish the SCI Water Street Building Fund.

Two other notes. The Center for Seafarers Rights which is known and respected throughout the maritime world has worked very hard to develop a network of chaplains and attorneys to respond to special problems as they arise.

Let me tell you how this works. Several weeks ago I received a telephone call from a repairman on a vessel in New Haven who had been slipped a note under the door by a crew member. It read, "In the name of God, help us." This vessel had run out of food and provisions; the crew had not been paid; two crew members in desperation had just jumped overboard into the frigid water.

Through the coordinating efforts of attorney Michael Smith of our Center, a chaplain of another agency brought immediate help to the crew. Provisions were found and temporary repair of the life boats and radar was accomplished.

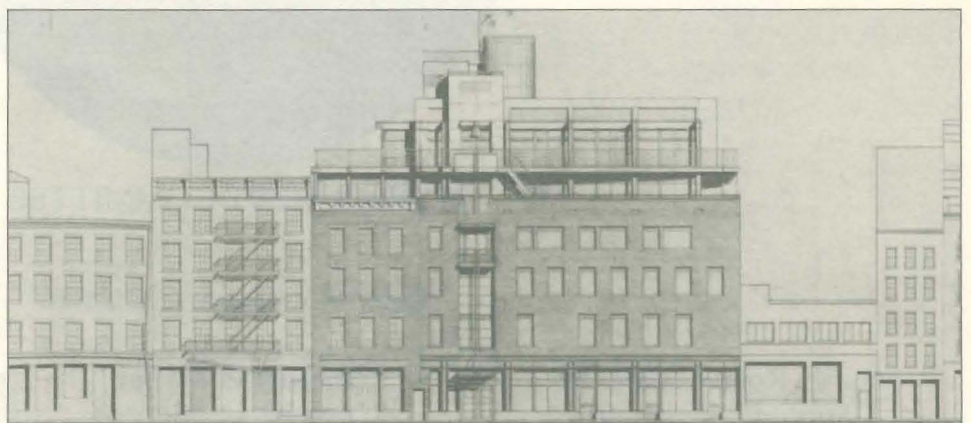
The ship was tracked down to Norfolk; another local agency was contacted who advised the US Coast Guard of the arrival. The Coast Guard, operating under the guidelines of ILO #147 (legislation in which SCI had a major role in Senate passage), took charge and made sure the ship was safe and properly provisioned before it left for a return voyage across the turbulent North Atlantic. All of this was orchestrated from our office here. "In the name of God, help us" the note read. Praise God, we were able to do so.



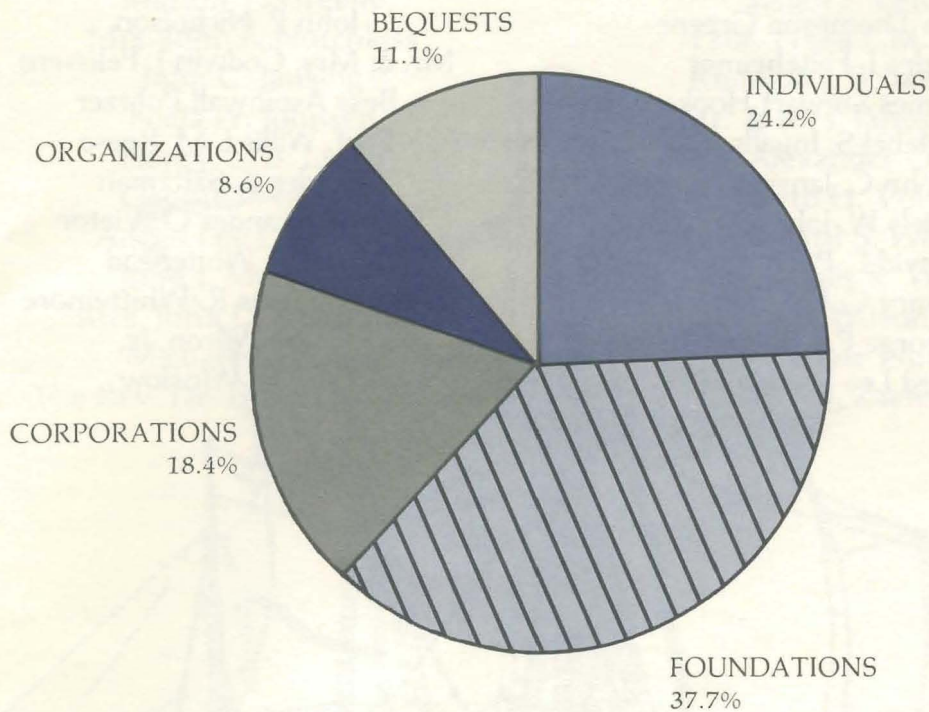
VOLUNTARY SUPPORT, 1989 FUND YEAR

AT THE CLOSE OF THE 1989 fundraising year on December 31, the Institute had received \$1,040,995 in voluntary support, representing the generosity of 1,769 contributors who made 2,540 gifts and grants over the twelve month period.

Of the funds received, \$534,248 were designated for the Annual Fund, while \$506,747 were contributed for capital needs and purposes, including the renovation of our International Seafarers' Center in Port Newark, NJ.

Total voluntary support includes \$367,283 from individuals, \$392,171 from foundations, \$191,539 from corporations and \$90,001 from organizations. Income from planned gifts, trusts and bequests accounted for \$115,457 of the contributions received from individuals.

THE COMMODORE CLUB

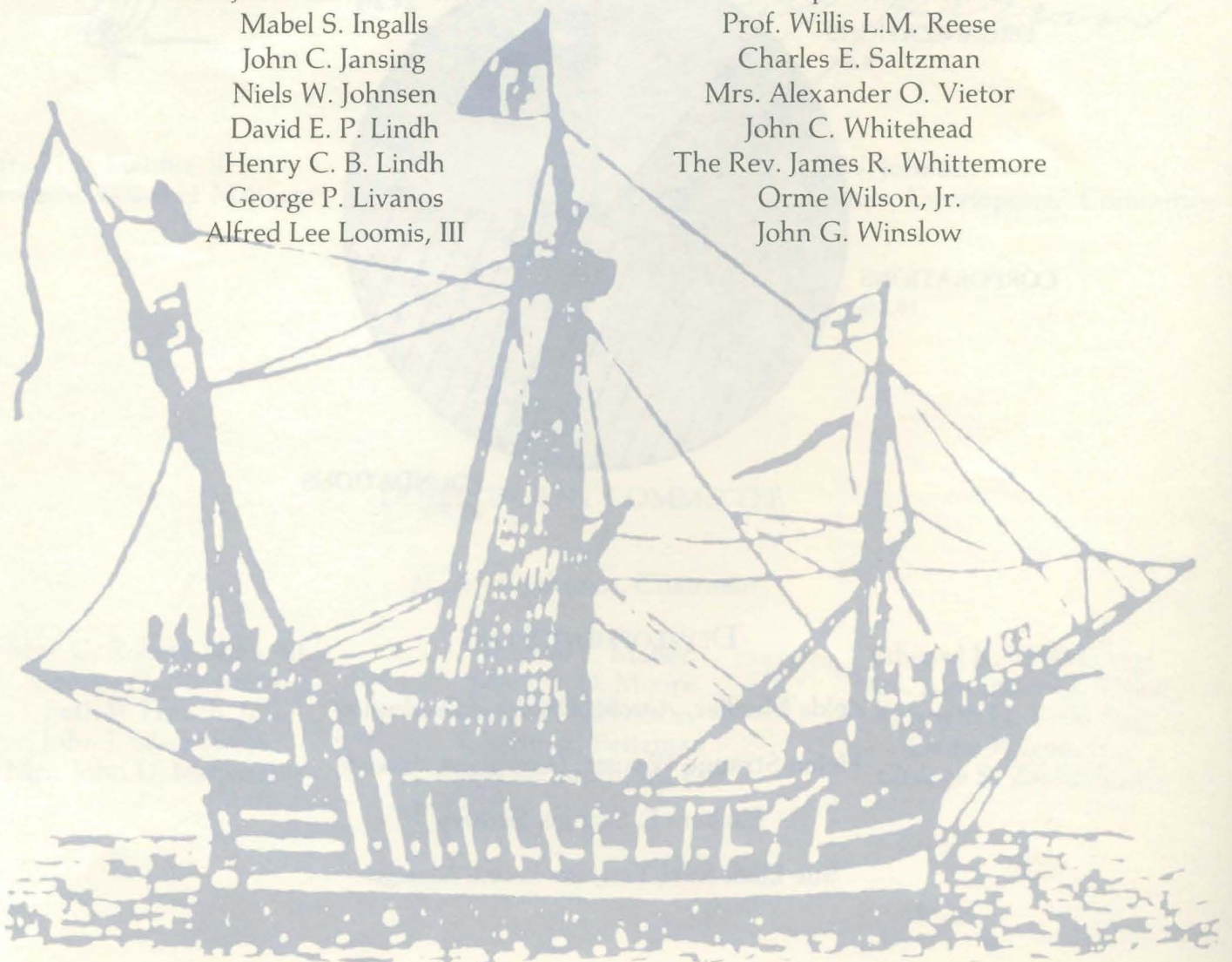

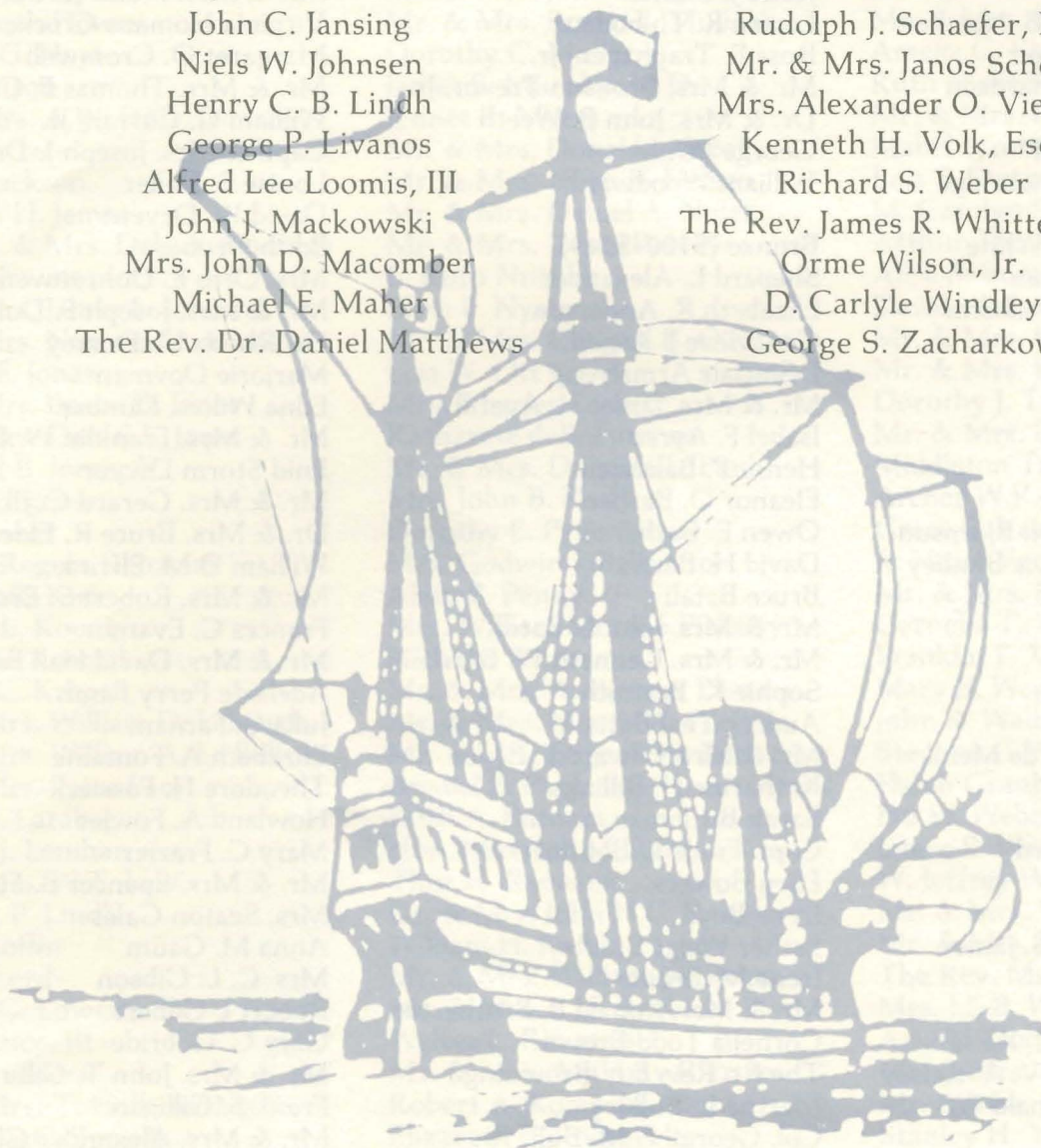


THE FLAGSHIP SOCIETY

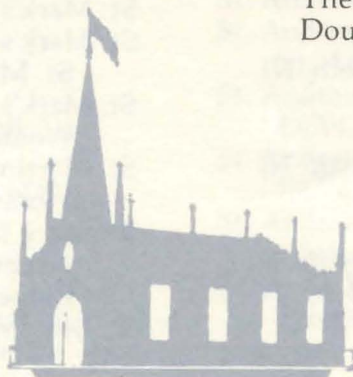

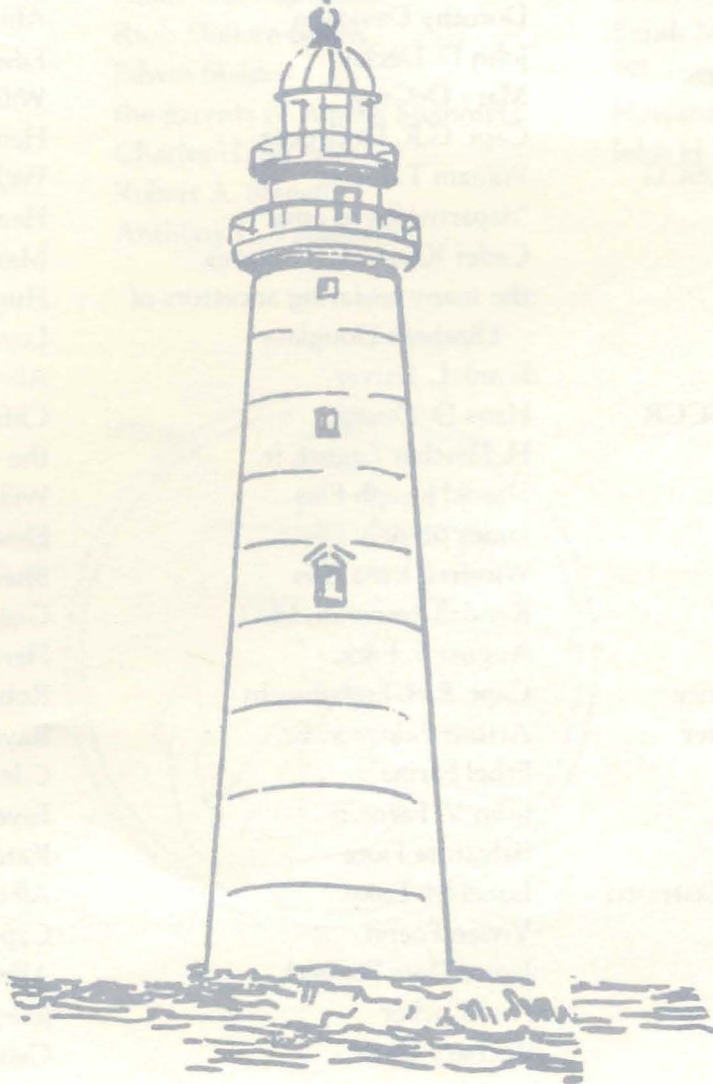

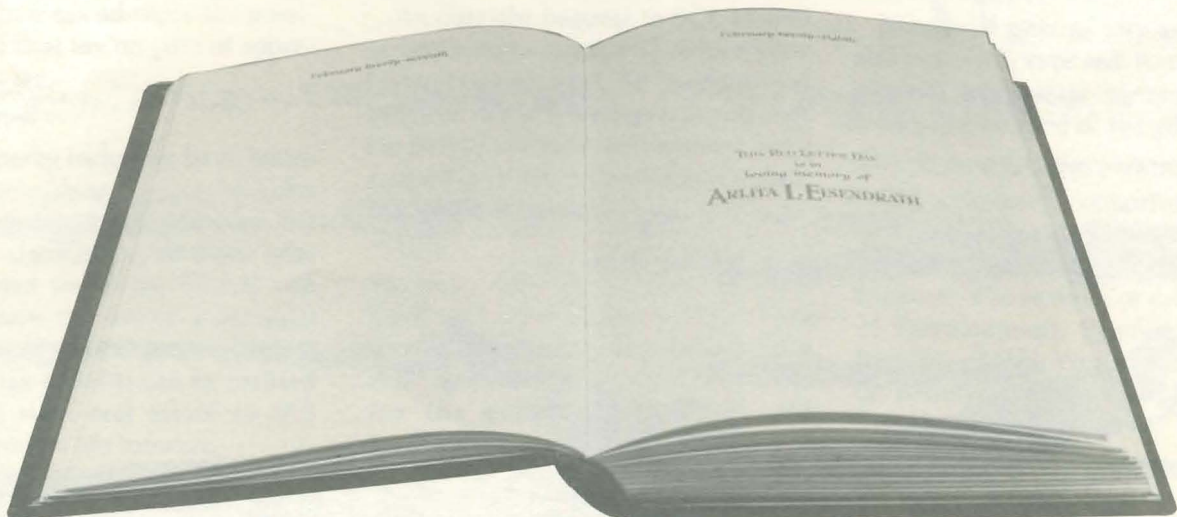

GIVING TO THE INSTITUTE

YOU MAY BE ABLE TO CONTRIBUTE more to the Institute than you realize. Current tax laws encourage generous gifts by providing significant tax incentives. If you itemize your deductions, the net cost of a gift to the Institute will be less in almost every case than the dollar amount of your contribution.

CASH

The simplest form of giving to SCI is cash. Gifts of cash are deductible for Federal income tax purposes up to a maximum of 50% of your adjusted gross income in any given year. Any excess may be carried forward and deducted, subject to the same 50% limitation, in the next five taxable years until such excess has been fully deducted.

SECURITIES

A gift of securities enables you to take a charitable deduction on your income tax return equivalent to the full market value of the securities. A gift of appreciated securities is of considerable tax advantage to you and allows you to avoid the tax on capital gains, which you would pay if you were to sell the securities. Generally, your deduction in any one year for the full market value of a gift of appreciated securities may not exceed 30% of your adjusted gross income. Any excess may be carried over and deducted, subject to the same 30% limitation, in the next five years until the excess has been fully deducted.

Donors who may be subject to Alternative Minimum Tax should discuss with their tax advisors the possible effect of that tax on gifts of appreciated property.

REAL ESTATE

Real property including land, buildings, or leaseholds are welcomed. Gifts of appreciated real estate follow the same general guidelines as those gifts of appreciated securities. Should you wish to retain the use of a personal residence during your lifetime, income and estate tax benefits can be realized by deeding such real estate to SCI while retaining a life interest.

LIFE INSURANCE

If you no longer need the protection of a life insurance policy, you may irrevocably transfer ownership of the pol-

icy to SCI. In most cases, you will be entitled to a charitable deduction equivalent approximately to the policy's cash surrender value. There are other options that can be advantageous to you regarding: 1. payment of premiums on policies; 2. fully paid insurance policies; 3. taking out a new insurance policy naming SCI as owner and sole beneficiary.

RETAINED LIFE INCOME GIFTS

You may make a gift to SCI now but continue to receive income from these assets. Money, securities (or in some cases other property) can be transferred irrevocably to a trustee and a specified annuity (or a percentage of principal value) will be paid each year to you and/or another beneficiary you name. After the death of the last income recipient, the principal belongs to SCI. A retained life income gift ordinarily has both income tax and estate tax advantages for you. Because these gifts (which are set up as trust funds—either in the form of unitrust or annuity trust) are separately invested, a minimum gift of \$50,000 is required to allow for adequate investment diversification.

BEQUESTS

An outright bequest to SCI, as well as bequests in trust, will reduce your Federal estate tax. An unrestricted bequest, one in which certain you enable SCI to add to its endowment or to expend in whole or in part as it judges best might read:

"I give _____ (dollars) to Seamen's Church Institute of New York and New Jersey, a New York Corporation having its principal office at 50 Broadway, New York, NY 10004, for the general purpose of said Institute."

There are also a number of other forms that a bequest may take including: 1. a residuary bequest (share or percentage of any residual estate after

specific bequests have been satisfied) 2. a contingent bequest (provision which becomes effective only if some condition is not met such as a spouse or child surviving you) 3. a charitable testamentary trust (assets bequeathed are to a trust which provides both for individuals and for SCI).

BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE

Personal or memorial gifts of \$35,000 or more entitle the donor to a special page, inscribed with your commemorative message, in the Institute's Book of Remembrance. This handcrafted, beautifully illuminated book is retained in the Institute's chapel and allows the donor to reserve a special memorial Red Letter Day in perpetuity. Book of Remembrance memorials can be established in a variety of ways including deferred gifts, bequests, endowments, or other special plans.

LIVING HONOR GIFTS

A thoughtful way to remember friends and relatives (and have them remember you) on birthdays, anniversaries and other special occasions. We will acknowledge your gift with an attractive letter to the Honoree and send you a receipt for your records.

MEMORIAL GIFTS

Memorial gifts of any amount are also gratefully received. At the donor's request appropriate members of the family are notified of the gift.
