Report of the Board of Managers.

The Our Society has completed its sixty-second year, perhaps Field. the most eventful year in its long history of usefulness. The results of our efforts more than ever justify their cost in money, time and labor, and our Society, like our nation, will become a world power. Out of the three million sailors toiling on the seven seas, at least 250,000 frequent this port every year. In outgoing ships they visit every port and carry with them the good and evil influences they assimilate here.

Work. Details of our local work may be found in the general sumwork. mary and in the synopsis of station reports, and will show a satisfactory growth on all the lines adopted and adapted. The aggregated results will be known only when the sea gives up its dead. Our aim is first to give religious privileges, then rational entertainment and attractive environment to all seamen while on shore, police and social protection from the evils that beset them, prompt collection of wages due them and punishment for those who abuse them.

To accomplish these objects our chaplains preach plainly, personally and conversationally. We furnish a sailors' home, several reading rooms with ample facilities for home correspondence and for transmission of earnings to dependent relatives, concerts and lectures adapted to the needs of a floating population temporarily on shore, and cultivate personal and friendly relations with the 6,924 men who have attended our entertainments and with the 18,946 who have been present at one or more of our 456 religious services.

We realize that in the short average of a sailor's active life (said not to exceed twelve years) and in their short stay on shore our officers and employees, in their ministrations, must be alert, sympathetic and untiring; and we are glad to report increasing usefulness at the various stations of the Society enumerated upon another page.

Our sister organization, the Legal Aid Society, through its Seamen's Branch, at No. 1 Broadway, has taken appropriate action on 428 men sent to it by this Society, in collecting unpaid wages, damages for cruel treatment, and in the general enforcement of laws for the protection of seamen.

Change in Stations
Stations
and in the Name.

Looking toward the ultimate centralization of our activities in the Institute soon to be erected, we have disposed of our stations at Pike Street and Coenties Slip, and have leased for a term of two years the premises at No. 2 State Street, adjoining our present Battery Station. It was with some regret that we abandoned those two stations, which where such important

factors in our Society's work. But in combining them with the Battery Station in its enlarged quarters we feel that greater results will be accomplished with greater economy and the work of the Society as a whole greatly strengthened.

The proceedings before the Supreme Court of this State for a change in the name of the Society culminated on April 5th of this year, and on that date the cumbersome title of "The Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen in the City and Port of New York" was dropped, and the Society assumed its new name, "Seamen's Church Institute of New York."

New Citizens of New York are responding generously to our Building. appeal for a Seamen's Institute, which is to supply 400 seamen with separate sleeping rooms, captains and officers with club rooms, a restaurant supplying single meals or board by the day or week, a free shipping bureau, class-rooms for nautical instruction, reading, writing, game and baggage rooms, banking and post office departments, and a large assembly hall for religious services, lectures and entertainments. The plot of land, about 90 feet square, at corner of Coenties Slip and South Street, has been bought at a cost of about \$200,000, all of which has been subscribed. Four hundred thousand dollars more will be needed for the construction and equipment of this proposed building.

This is a problem and a responsibility greater than has ever before been assumed by our Society, or by any like Society in New York. But it is the natural and logical development of our work. This is not an unreasonable sum to ask from the citizens of New York—New York, which owes its splendid prosperity to the fact that it is a seaport. Should not New York, the first port of our country, set an example to the world in safeguarding those who man the decks and furl the sails of its prosperity? We are still far behind other large cities in their care for seamen, and if we are not sustained we must place the responsibility upon the opulent commercial, maritime and civic interests of this magnificent port, which leads the world in its generous and humane interest in men who labor and suffer on land. We cannot believe that they will knowingly continue to neglect those who toil and ultimately perish on the sea.

And so we appeal to all citizens of New York and to all who are interested in our work to respond according to their means and send their subscriptions to the chairman of the committee named below. Surely this will be regarded as a privilege and an opportunity by the people of New York. Their subscriptions will be "bread cast upon the waters" of their

Our Free Although we have not procured the hoped for establish-Shipping ment of a national free shipping bureau, the vastly increasing number of seamen shipped (see General Summary) at our Bureau. stations without payment of illegal shipping fees and bonuses, furnishes cumulative proof to men and shipowners alike that their interests are greatly promoted by our Society. Men have enjoyed the hospitality of our religious services, reading room, lunch counter, baggage rooms and shipping facilities. The protection thus extended has reduced to a minimum the evils of the crimps and criminal boarding house keepers, many of whom have abandoned their vile traffic in human flesh and have gone into other business. The opportunity to find men among an estimated 165,000 who visit our reading rooms and most of whom desire shipment is gladly availed of by a rapidly increasing number of captains seeking for crews.

Boat mission and practical work in the churchless harbor and has become indispensable in the recent enlargement of our scope by its 320 trips during the year and its transportation of an average of 197 men each month. The continued co-operation of the ladies who constitute the Seamen's Benefit Society in keeping this vessel in active work is gratefully acknowledged. Its average monthly cost for maintenance is about \$467.87, or \$5,578.75 per annum, but its value is vastly greater. Of this sum we have received \$3,000 from the said Society.


Convention has this year continued its committee to devise means for the erection of proposed building. In view of the extraordinary interest shown in this work by the convention, and agreeably to the spirit of the canon printed in full below, we make special appeal to every parish in this our Diocese for its hearty and generous support.

There are several bills still pending in Congress for Legislation. the improvement of our mercantile marine, which we trust will be acted upon at the present session. Our endeavor to prevent and punish "shanghaiing" has been successful and the anti-shanghai bill became a law in June of this year. Several convictions have already been obtained under the provisions of this law, and we have reasonable hope that it will encourage the sailor to protect himself and arouse the public prosecutor to more strenuous effort; and while it is not to be expected that this legislation will abolish shanghaiing any more than capital punishment has done away with murder, it is bound to have a great deterrent effect, and with energetic co-operation on the part of the prosecuting attorneys a great step in advance will have been made for the protection of the American sailor. Our committee on legislation is now endeavoring to obtain appropriate relief and protection for men employed on scows and barges, who are greatly exposed to needless disaster from lack of life-saving appliances. (A photograph of a barge taken in New York Harbor, showing the absence of railing, lifeboats, freeboard, etc., is printed elsewhere in this report.)

In Death again diminished our number, and during the past Memoriam. year we have lost from our honorary members David H. Decker, who served upon the Board of Managers from 1887 to 1905. In the recent sudden death of Wilhelmus Mynderse the Society has suffered a severe loss. He was deeply interested in our work and his advice and wise counsels will be greatly missed.

Legacies. There have been several legacies paid to the Society during the past year, but they have been under wills mentioned in previous reports, except a legacy of \$1,000 paid in September of this year by the estate of Herbert Valentine.

Finances. This year we have expended in the most economical manner \$32,780.57 in carrying on the work of the Society. Our receipts for current expenses were only \$19,518.25, thus compelling us to draw largely from our trust funds the additional amount of this year's deficit, viz: \$13,262.32. It is with great regret, and even dismay, that we find ourselves year after year making inroads upon the fund which is our main source of support, yet curtailment of effort in the face of the urgent demands of our increasing work seems inadvisable and impossible unless we shirk our great and growing opportunity for usefulness.



Report of Committee for Battery Station. 1906.

During the current year the work at Pike Street, Coenties Slip and at the Battery Station has been consolidated, and the premises now occupied have been renovated and adapted at a considerable cost, but greatly to the advantage of the many departments concentrated at Nos. 1-2 State Street.

The regular meetings of the Executive Committee and the Board of Managers and of several Station Committees are held here; the banking, post-office and baggage departments are much better accommodated, while the shipping bureau, the reading, writing and game rooms have more space, light and heat, and officers and apprentices are furnished with adequate provisions for homelike and convenient club facilities. The Chaplain and the numerous staff are also provided with offices necessary for economical and efficient service. The quarters now used for a free shipping bureau were for years occupied as a liquor saloon, which, by reason of its proximity to the British Consular shipping offices and of its very attractive allurements to seamen, constituted for years a great danger to men receiving accumulated wages at the end of a long voyage.

The displacement of this saloon is in itself a blessing, and may account in part for the increase of moneys deposited for safekeeping and for transmissions to dependent relatives of seamen, aggregating this year over \$120,000.

Report of the Committee on Legislation.

During the past year the Society aided, through its delegate to Washington, who appeared before the Congressional Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries, in procuring the enactment of what is known as the

Anti-Shanghai law, approved June 28, 1906.

This measure defines the crime of kidnapping seamen and procuring their shipment by false representations, by force and by the use of drugs or intoxicants, and prescribes a severe penalty, by fine and imprisonment, to which all persons implicated on ship or shore in this crime are subject. Several convictions have already been obtained, and it is believed that seamen will be comparatively free hereafter from one of their greatest suffer-

ings. (Copy of law herewith.)

Your committee is now at work upon a plan for the shortening of tow lines at sea and the better protection of men employed upon scows and barges used in this and other harbors, in the transportation of garbage, ashes, dirt, etc., to distant dumping grounds. The limiting of number of barges and scows for each steam tug and the use of guard rails upon the outer edge of the deck and of other life-saving appliances will result we believe, in the saving of many lives. The Commissioner of Navigation and the harbor authorities have expressed their sympathy with our efforts in these particulars, and we hope to enlist the co-operation of our Congressional Representatives in obtaining the necessary legislation.

The text of the law is as follows:

"Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that whoever with intent that any person shall perform service or labor of any kind on board of any vessel of any kind engaged in trade and commerce among the several states or with foreign nations, shall-

Procure or induce or attempt to procure or induce another by force, threats or representations which the person making them knows or believes to be untrue, or while the so-induced or procured is intoxicated or under the influence of any drug, to go on board of any such vessel.

"Second. Induce or procure or attempt to induce or procure another by force or threats or by representations known or believed by the person making them to be untrue, or while the person so induced or procured is intoxicated or under the influence of any drug, to sign or in any wise to enter into any agreement to go on board any such vessel to perform service or labor thereon, shall be fined not more than one thousand dollars or imprisonment for one year, or both.


"Section 2. That whoever shall knowingly detain on board any such vessel any such person induced to go on board thereof or to enter into an agreement to go on board thereof by any of the means defined in Section

1 hereof, shall be punished as provided in Section 1. "Section 3. That whoever shall knowingly aid or abet in the doing of any of the things declared unlawful by Sections 1 and 2 of this Act shall

be deemed a principal and punished accordingly. "Section 4. That Sections 4, 6 and 24 of Chapter 28 of the Acts of Congress, approved December 21, 1898, shall apply to all vessels engaged in the taking of oysters, anything in Section 26 of said last-mentioned Act to the contrary notwithstanding."

The accompanying map shows the location of the Brooklyn branch of this Society. It is situated on the corner of First Ave. and 42d St., two blocks from the water front, on the property of the Bush Terminal Co. The station was opened in August, 1904.

For lack of funds it has not been possible to greatly develop this branch; the building is small, two stories high; both floors are fitted substantially alike for reading, writing and game rooms. The annual cost of maintaining this station is about \$1,500.00. We hope and believe that the people of Brooklyn and of the Diocese of Long Island will lend a hand and help us to do the important work that lies at our door.

The number of steamers coming to this portion of the Brooklyn water

front convinces the Society that it has acted wisely in establishing a station in this neighborhood, as there is a great opportunity for growth. When the last pier is completed, there will be seven, each one large enough to accommodate six steamers at once. The vessels docking here carry crews of nearly every nationality, and many of them are non-English-speaking seamen. Here will be found the most polyglot sailor population in the Port of New York; how to meet the needs and adapt the work to this ever and rapidly increasing foreign element is our special problem. Some of the companies docking steamers at the Bush docks are the American-Hawaiian S. S. Co., manned largely by Spanish and Japanese crews; the Russian Volunteer Fleet, manned by Russians speaking the Russian language and the Estonish, Lettish and Finnish dialects; the Austro-American S. S. Co., manned by Italians and Germans; the Prince Line, its Mediterranean ships carrying Italian crews and its other vessels manned by crews consisting of English, German, Swedish, Russians, &c.; the Hansa Line and the Sloman Line, manned by Germans; the Dutch West India Mail Co. ships, manned by Hollanders; the Norton Line, carrying mixed crews; the Inver Line, officers and engineers British, but the crews consisting of Hindoo coolies, Malays and Chinese.

Very many are unable to speak or understand the English language. What a glorious opportunity there is before us for uplifting and blessing these seafaring people if only adequate equipment and means were provided.


At the annual meeting of the Society held on Dec. 11th, 1906, the Bishop of the Diocese of Long Island was elected one of its Vice-Presidents.



Annual Report of the Seamen's Benefit Society.

The Seamen's Benefit Society is very happy to report good work done during the past year.

Five regular business meetings were held during the winter.

The Sunday evening teas for the apprentice boys have been continued; this is a very important branch of the work and one which grows steadily. These apprentice boys have the same position in the British Merchant Marine as midshipmen in the Royal Navy.

The coffee bar at No. 1 State Street has been maintained by the Society on an increased scale and has done splendid service in keeping sailors out of the saloon, which is too often their only place of refuge, the poor man's club.

The Society has provided a pianist for Wednesday evenings and a pianist and refreshments for the Saturday social evenings at the Mission; this is a most important feature of the work for the friendless sailors who come to our shores—strangers in a strange land.

Sailors' helmets, wristlets, mufflers, books, magazines, etc., have been sent to the Chaplain by the Society and its friends.

A concert was given on March 1 at the Waldorf-Astoria, under the auspices of the "Seamen's Benefit Society," which was even a greater success financially, artistically and socially than the one given by the Society two years ago; it was considered the most all-round successful charity concert of last winter. The concert netted \$3,836.05, of which \$3,000 was sent by the Society towards the maintenance of the Institute boat "Sentinel."

The Society is very grateful to its good friends for their kindly interest and unfailing generosity.

New York men and women are indeed charitable, and the "Seamen's Benefit Society" feels that it is not in vain that it pleads the cause of the sailor.
