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

## SEAMEN'S CHURCH INSTITUTE

Of New York

For the Year 1929

The Seamen's Church Institute of New York has celebrated the completion of its *eighty-fifth* year of corporate existence by opening several new sleeping floors and by a general expansion into the larger integument of its new plant.

This great effort to minister to the needs of the sailor, like all healthy living organisms, has gained strength from a long struggle with its environment. The sailor was preyed upon by crimps and robbed of his pay. Very well, then, give him a safe lodging and a "bank" for his money. The sailor needs good food and drink. Very well, then, give him a restaurant, a cafeteria and a soda fountain. The sailor needs a place for his dunnage, and facilities for rehabilitation. Very well, then, give him a baggage room, a laundry, a tailor and a barber shop. The sailor needs wholesome amusement,

friendly advice, and a place of worship. Very well, then, give him a theatre, a game room, a reading room, a writing room, and last, but by no means least, a "house mother," a chapel and a clerical staff.

That is how it all came about. Nevertheless, since it is a living organism, the whole is greater than the sum of its parts.

### *Religious and Social Service Department*

This very important department carries a staff of eighteen trained men and women, of whom three are clergymen.

Church services are held regularly in the chapel at the Institute and also at the Marine Hospitals on Staten Island and Ellis Island. Hospitals, jails, courts, ships and steamship companies are visited by the clerical staff; United States Commissioners are interviewed regarding sea-

men's releases, and steamship companies with respect to their wages. Contact is also kept with foreign consuls, banks, and various government representatives, and sick seamen are visited in hospitals.

Missing men are the particular charge of the "House Mother," Mrs. Roper. Bulletins are regularly published and sent all over the world, and, in this way, during the past year 1,951 cases of missing men were handled, of whom 316 were located. 1,856 personal interviews were held, and 627 personal letters written by the "House Mother," an invaluable and widely beloved person.

Besides the newly completed Auditorium, where a weekly program of entertainment is regularly put on, consisting of moving picture shows, lectures, smokers and occasional informal discussions, reading and writing rooms are patronized to capacity.

Boys and young men in training for officers under the British or other Merchant Marines have a special room to themselves, known as the Apprentice Room, under the charge of a hostess, and are treated to dances, entertainments and sightseeing trips, and are visited, when sick, in hospitals.



A carefully-organized system of relief work is carried on for the benefit of seamen who can exhibit proper discharge papers. A revolving loan fund supplemented by a card-index system, enables the Institute to minister to the needs of the destitute and deserving. In certain cases, also, relief is given in the form of meals and lodgings under the general classification of loans. Valuable assistance in giving relief is derived from membership in the Welfare Council, a central bureau through which cooperation and interchange of problems with other institutions are facilitated.

## Hotel Department

During the year 417,612 lodgings were furnished. The capacity of the Building is now 1,500 lodgings per night, including rooms and dormitory beds. Over 800,000 sales were made

at the soda fountain, representing an increase of fifty per cent. over the preceding year.



## General Stores

General Stores receives goods which the Institute purchases, and checks them for weight, breakage and quality, wherever possible. It issues on requisition some 600 to 700 items, and also ships outgoing goods.

## Baggage Department

During the year a total of 83,534 pieces of dunnage were received and 86,463 delivered. There were 88,764 temporary deliveries for change of clothes; 7,522 extension baggage checks were issued, making the total number of pieces handled 258,662.



## Post Office

The Post Office is operated by the Government, the space being leased to it by the Institute at a nominal rental. Approximately 450,000 pieces of mail were received and delivered or forwarded, and nearly 3,000 letter boxes are rented to the seamen.




## Engineer's Department

This department furnishes power for lighting, heating, elevator, laundry, and refrigerating purposes, and also supplies hot water throughout the building and keeps the plumbing in repair. Its services are economical and indispensable.

## Maintenance of Order

This department is in charge of a chief, four sergeants, eight special officers, four roundsmen, and four watchmen. There is also special night supervision. Though over two million, five hundred thousand men entered the building during 1929, the number of arrests for the entire year was only 45.



## Marine and Other Education

This department continues its particular work of preparing students for examination for licenses. First aid lectures are also delivered, in co-operation with the United States Public Health Service. As a result of the tragic sinking of the *Vestris*, special instruction by the Principal has been given in lifeboat launching and drill. The School is being re-equipped and re-organized and an effort is being made to enlarge its scope, with a special appeal to amateur yachtsmen for their use and support.

## Employment Bureau



Of 10,662 referred to jobs employment was found during the year for 8,637 men; 6,882 for service at sea, and 1,755 for shore work.

## Seamen's Funds Department


Deposits of funds to the number of 6,885 were made by seamen from 915 cities and towns, representing 63 countries. The amount deposited was \$607,-

364.35, of which amount \$103,-481.29 was transmitted at the direction of the seamen. Money orders, traveler's checks, etc., to the number of 4,666 were issued.



## First-Aid by Radio

Radio medical service is carried on with the co-operation of the United States Public Health Service and the Radiomarine Corporation of America. It ministers to ships at sea not carrying doctors and desiring medical advice.



## Ways and Means Department

This department is charged with making up the large discrepancy between the cost of maintenance and the amount which our seamen guests can afford to pay. This it does very efficiently through the generosity of the Institute's friends. The department publishes *THE LOOKOUT*, which is printed and distributed monthly among the friends of the Institute.

## Seamen's Church Institute Associations

Sixteen groups of women in and about New York City, meeting through a Central Council, render invaluable help in many ways, not the least of which is in giving publicity to the needs of the Institute. Raising money, securing gifts of wearing apparel for the seamen, and arranging social affairs in the Institute, the services of these Associations are greatly valued by the Board of Managers.

The statistics on the following pages will crystallize this general view of the year's work



at the Institute. For a full realization of the vitality and spiritual sparkle of the work, the Institute itself should be visited. Visitors are most welcome, and are especially invited to arrange their visits so as to include a luncheon in the restaurant. We believe that the food and the prices will both be a cause of amazement.

For their devotion to the work of the Institute during the year the Board of Managers desires to express its deep gratitude to the Superintendent and his staff, and to assure each one of the friends of the Institute that his or her contribution has been carefully and economically handled and conscientiously devoted to what has seemed to the Board, after careful study, to be the best possible use for it.
