FORM OF BEQUEST.

I give and bequeath to the "Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, in the City and Port of New York," incorporated by the Legislature of the State of New York, in the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-four, the sum of _____ Dollars, for the purposes of said Society.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE SOCIETY.

THE Annual Meeting of the Society was held, agreeably to the Constitution, on the evening of Easter Monday, the 12th of April, 1852, officers and managers elected, and the reports referred, as usual, to the Board of Managers for printing and circulation.

The Eighth Anniversary of the Society was celebrated at St. George's Church, on Sunday evening, April 18th, 1852, Rev. Thos. H. Taylor, D.D., Vice-President, presided, assisted by Rev. Francis Vinton, D.D. and Rev. C. H. Halsey, Vice-Presidents. The church services were conducted by Rev. Drs. Haight and Tyng, and a sermon preached by the Rt. Rev. Alonzo Potter, D.D., L.L.D., Bishop of Pennsylvania; the report of the Board of Managers was read, and a collection made in aid of the Mission.

THE SOCIETY has received blessing from God. The past year has been crowned with goodness. We rejoice that we have been counted worthy to be put into the ministry of the Gospel; and that our DIVINE MASTER has acknowledged His own work in our labors. Let us, therefore, give our first and freshest thoughts to the LORD of the Harvest; calling upon our Souls and all that is within us, to bless His Holy Name.

I. THE TREASURY. We would report the condition of our Finances. We hope to have money enough for our engagements; perhaps we shall have enough for our desires. We have paid all our promises; but there will be due on the first day of May, the sum of four hundred dollars, not yet collected.

Our hearts have been enlarged to extend and multiply our efforts.

While we have no complaint to make of defalca-

tion, we have longed to be rich enough to bestow the means of Grace on a larger number of Seamen.

The Treasurer's Report will exhibit a fair balance sheet, provided your eyes settle themselves only on the debit and credit total.

The Amount *Received*, from April 21st, 1851, to April 12th, 1852, is \$4,141.53:—*Paid* \$4,135. But we may startle you with the announcement that Forty Thousand Seamen come and go on the waters of this great port annually. The money which we have received and paid is only about 10 cents for the benefit of each Sailor. If then you will observe the items of our expenditure and receipts, and see how few they are; if, in contrast with the work to be done, you will notice the means to do it with, and discover what minimum microscopic dimensions they possess; if you will ponder the small expense of our vast enterprise; either you will be glad or you will be mortified.

You will be *glad*, if you think the Lord's work should not cost much money: you will be mortified, if you regard no sacrifices too great for missionary efforts to save the souls of sinners.

The Managers have been guided necessarily by your measure of beneficence. They have been restrained by the standard of liberality in their contributing constituents. We think that your offerings ought to be increased many fold, "some thirty, some sixty, some an hundred." We affectionately invoke every true-hearted Churchman to consider his

own obligations, and to give abundantly "as God has prospered him."

We proceed to Report what has been done by

II. THE MISSIONARIES. In the Chapel of our Saviour there have been Baptisms: Infants, 57; Adults, 4. Persons Confirmed, 17. Added to the Holy Communion, 19. Marriages, 26. Funerals, 13. 1500 Bound Volumes of "religious reading," 20,000 pages of Tracts, over 200 Bibles, and nearly 300 Prayer Books, have been given to Seamen leaving the Port.

In the Chapel of the Holy Comforter, there have been Baptisms: Infants, 23; Adult, 1. Persons Confirmed, 17, eight of them Seamen, and two the wives of Seamen. Added to the Holy Communion, 12, four of them Seamen. Present number of Communicants, 60. Marriages, 16. Funerals, 6. The number of Divine Services during the year (including those at the "Home," is 204. 169 Bibles, 123 Prayer-Books, 46,860 pages of Tracts, and 250 other Religious Books have been distributed.

These results are eloquent advocates for perseverance, and strong persuasives to wider efforts.

Accordingly, the Managers have appointed

III. A MISSIONARY AT LARGE. Under the direction of ALMIGHTY God, the attempt has been made to preach the Gospel to them that loiter by the way-side.

A Missionary at large has been sent to the Seamen on the wharves and in the Boarding houses. Standing on the prow of a Ship or Barge, he has on Sundays addressed increasing congregations.

On Friday Evenings he has held meetings in the Sailor Boarding houses, and during the week he has been occupied in distributing Bibles, Prayer-books, and Tracts.

He has led many Seamen, at the hours of Divine Service, to the Chapels.

The experiment is begun by us, of thus searching out the wandering and the lost sheep of Christ's flock.

Your Board augur well of this undertaking, and commend it to your Alms and Prayers.

IV. THE HOME, on the North River, continues to receive the fostering care of the Brethren who have volunteered for its support. It receives no financial aid from the Society, but is entirely a private enterprise. Religious services, pastoral oversight, fraternal advice, prudent management; have resulted in great blessings to the inmates of the Home. Sailors are enabled, in that refuge, to escape many of the temptations incident to their condition: while their intellectual, financial, and spiritual prosperity has been advanced.

V. A BURYING GROUND FOR SEAMEN has been given to the Society by the liberality of the Corporation of "The Evergreen Cemetery."

A sufficient sum has been contributed by merchants and other friends of the sailor, for the erection of an iron fence to enclose the ground. The Board of Managers now publicly acknowledge their gratitude for these donations.

VI. A SEAMEN'S LIBRARY is established in one of the chapels. There is great need of more volumes. It is desirable to possess a sufficient number to make the Library *circulating*.

VII. The Board have the pleasure of again acknowledging a liberal Contribution to its funds of One Hundred and Seventeen Dollars and Fifty-eight Cents, by "The Auxiliary P. E. Ch. Miss. Society for Seamen."

This AUXILIARY is composed of young persons just entering upon manhood. The interest which they have felt and manifested for the seamen's cause, is a most pleasing token of the favor of God. It gives promise that sailors will not want Christian friends when we are gone.

The managers take occasion to acknowledge their further obligations for the continued liberality of "The Prot. Episcopal Bible and Common Prayer Book Society," "The Prot. Episcopal Tract Society," "The Prot. Episcopal Sunday School Union," "The Prot. Episcopal Evangelical Knowledge Society," "The New-York Bible Society," and "The American Tract Society."

From these sources we have drawn largely to provide for the wants and to satisfy the demands of seamen. We have received intelligence of great blessings and much comfort, administered to the sailor, from the pages we have given him. They have proved to be, for his healing, as "leaves from the Tree of Life."

VIII. The Board of Managers desire, in conclusion, to record a tribute to the memory of Dr. JOHN NEILSON, JR., one of the Managers, who has departed this life. His example of constancy, quietness, and zeal, presenting a beautiful combination of Missionary attributes, furnishes a pattern that we would imitate while doing the work that he loved so well.

The Charity to which this Society is pledged commends itself to every Christian heart. We challenge your affection for it. In addition to the engaging claims of seamen, God's blessing on our feeble doings inspires us to press the Cause before your consciences, that we may be furnished with "material aid" to accomplish manifold victories

REPORT

OF THE

MISSIONARY OF THE FLOATING CHURCH OF OUR SAVIOUR, FOR
THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 6, 1852.

It is with faith in the sure promises of God that the Missionary of the Floating Church of our Saviour has labored during the past year, and he has had no reason to falter in his work; but, on the contrary, most abundant cause for thankfulness to God, and most animating evidences of the efficiency and sure fruit of the Society's labors in that locality of our mission which has been assigned to his hands. Many and cheering facts have been from time to time embodied in his monthly reports to the board of managers; and were there space in the compass of this yearly report to the Society to detail them to the friends of our Mission, he would not apprehend, on their part, a diminished interest in this field of our operations. Twenty-five names of candidates for Confirmation were on his list a few Sundays ago, when the Right-Rev. Bishop Carlton Chase, of New-Hampshire, administered that holy rite in our chapel; and although some were obliged to go to sea before the time arrived, yet seventeen received on that solemn occasion "the laying on of hands" by one of Apostolic commission, praying for them that God would defend these, his servants, with his heavenly grace, that they might continue *His* forever, to whom they then renewedly surrendered themselves in the Holy Covenant of their baptism.

Fifty-seven children and four adult persons have been baptised; nineteen have been added to the Communion; twenty-one couples have been joined in the bands of holy matrimony.

Thirteen persons have been buried by your Missionary. On some occasions, the bodies of the deceased have been carried

into the Floating Church of our Saviour, for the performance of our solemn funeral services.

Your Missionary, in closing his report, will briefly state that at no period in the history of our Mission to seamen in the city and port of New-York, has the Floating Church of our Saviour been attended by so large a number of persons, exclusively seamen, as during the last year. Over 1500 bound volumes of religious reading have been put into their hands, on leaving our chapels on Sundays, and going to sea; and over 20,000 pages of tracts with over 250 Bibles, 509 Testaments, and nearly 300 of our Book of Common Prayer, with other standard books of devotion prepared by the prelates and ministers of our church. Your Missionary has been deeply indebted to the American Tract Society, to the New-York Bible Society, the Episcopal Sunday School Union, and the Episcopal Tract and Bible and Common Prayer Book Society, and the Protestant Episcopal Evangelical Knowledge Society, for liberal donations whenever called upon.

THE FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Missionary of the Chapel of the Holy Comforter.

NEW-YORK, APRIL 5th, 1852.

It seems scarcely possible that I have completed the fifth year of my Ministry and co-operation with the Board in its mission to the seamen of this City and Port. But so it is. Time hastens on—year quickly succeeds year—each one shortening the period for our work of winning souls to Christ from among the hardy tars of the ocean, and giving the watchword as they pass, "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might." In reviewing the one just closed, we find some evidences that God's smile is upon us, and that he has blessed our work. To Him be the glory of the success which has resulted from our efforts to interest our fellows in the great salvation. A few, we trust, have been constrained to yield themselves in faith and repentance to the service of the Lord who bought them, and have made their public profession of religion, by a renewal of their vows of baptism in the rite of confirmation. Some of them are now, and the rest will soon become, communicants. Among the number is one who was truly "as a brand plucked from the burning." And if we could point to this one sailor only, as all the seen result of our work, we should feel that the Mission had accomplished much under God, in the promotion of His glory and man's eternal interests. We do a great work, through grace, when we turn one sailor from the error of his ways, if we remember his position and privileges,—the influences thrown around him, and the influence going out from him. But we have more than one, as will be seen by the following statement which will give some idea of the Mission itself.

Baptisms:—23 infants; 1 adult, a seaman's wife.

Confirmed—17; 7 of these seamen; 2 the wives of sailors.

Holy Communion, added—12, 4 of these seamen. Whole number, as near as can be ascertained, about 60. Marriages 15; Funerals 6.

Distribution of books, &c., as follows: Bibles 169; Prayer Books 153; other books, about 250; Tracts 46,860 pages.

There have been the two regular services upon the Lord's day throughout the year; an additional one on Sunday evening from the first of October until Easter, (except from the Epiphany to Ash Wednesday). During the season of Lent, a service on Wednesday evening at the Chapel, and on Friday at the Home, and through the Holy Week, daily morning and evening service.

THE HOME.

This Institution continues to grow in usefulness. It has afforded me increased facilities for reaching the sailor, and I find it an efficient means for doing him good and interesting him in the care of his immortal soul. We have had many interesting incidents at the Home of the awakening of seamen upon the subject of religion, which, in several instances, by the blessing of Almighty God, have issued in their conversion from the service of sin, to the obedience of the Faith and the following of Christ; while the reformations from drunkenness have been many, and almost all of them lasting. It would make this report too long to cite instances, and therefore the following information will enable all to see whether or not a Sailor's Home under the eye of the Missionary is of any benefit to such a Mission as is confided to our trust.

The number of seamen entered the House for the year,	560
Assisted to clothing in part and entire,.....	55
Number fed at the expense of the House,.....	60
Reformed from drunkenness,.....	75

The amount of money thus saved and sent in sums from five to fifty dollars to the families of seamen, and deposited in the Seamen's Savings Bank, \$1,165 25, for which we have re-

ceipts on file. Kind friends have assisted us to clothing, or the means to obtain it, for the needy. The House has sustained all its own expenses, except the rent, which has been furnished by those interested in the Home; and being now known, we hope it will do something towards the rent for the year to come.

THE POOR.

The poor, other than those of the sailor, we have with us, claiming our attention and care. By a resolution of the Board, one of the boxes in the Chapel has been appropriated to gifts for the poor and given in the Missionary's charge. Other friends have sent of their abundance more liberally this year, and it may be well to state that since the resolution, the box has afforded..... \$22 40

Our year's labor, we think, encourages us to greater toil, and that Almighty God will be graciously pleased to bless us still, and give us faith and patience to fulfil our solemn trust, is the daily prayer of one of your "helpers in Christ Jesus."
