Report of the Board of Managers.

THE golden chimes of Jubilee ring out on this our fiftieth anniversary the glad news of steady growth and progress. Since the small beginning of the Society in 1844, starting as an outcome of the Young Men's Church Missionary Society, and having among those earliest interested, such men as Bishops Bedell and Whitehouse, the Revs. L. P. W. Balch, J. H. Hobart and Smith Pyne, with many laymen whose interest in the individual character of the work lasted until their death,—the Society long since became an established factor and power for good in this great City.

It had become apparent to many thoughtful workers that a well organized and separate Society for the special care of the many sailors of all nationalities who come into our port, could accomplish more good than an auxiliary, so a beginning was made by holding services under the Rev. B. C. C. Parker, in an upper room at the corner of Pike and South Streets. The work so soon demonstrated its value, and many becoming interested, a floating chapel was built and moored at the foot of Pike Street. The Society had now become established; took the name of the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, in the City and Port of New York, and was incorporated April 12th, 1844. In the first annual report, appear as Managers the names of Thomas P. Cummings as Recording Secretary, John Davenport and E. M. Duncan, who are still in the Board, having shown through all these years unflinching devotion to the work. Others of the present Board whose names are entered within the next few years, are Messrs. Trowbridge, Rogers, Richards, and Burdett. The first annual report shows receipts for \$1,713, and disbursements of about \$1,650.

In 1846, through collections from the Churches interested and individual donations, money enough was raised to build another floating Church, which was placed at the foot of Dey Street, on the North river, where it remained for ten years, and was then transferred to the foot of Laight Street, and later still to Hubert Street. Services were established here in 1847, under the charge of the Rev. D. V. M. Johnson, whose earnest work made this effort also a great success. About this time the Corporation of Trinity Church granted an annual stipend of \$500.

Each succeeding report for the ensuing years tells of growth. A Missionary at Large was added to the work, and through the influence of the

Rev. Mr. Johnson, a Sailors' Home was started, being carried on at first by the contributions of individual managers until the entire Board, approving of the good accomplished, purchased, in 1854, a lot and building in Franklin Square, and called it the New Sailors' Home, where the work of influencing and protecting seamen was for many years steadily carried on.

The cost of this property was \$22,218, special subscriptions to the amount of \$16,000 being received.

The first ten years show a record of 582 baptisms, 216 confirmations and 316 communicants.

To go into details of all the work accomplished by the separate Missionaries would take too much space and time. We can but give the main events in the life of the Society.

Owing to a generous bequest from Capt. S. M. Thompson, the Society bought the bulkhead at the foot of Pike Street for \$5,000, and later was built the Floating Church of our Saviour, which still attracts the seamen by its interesting services.

Open air services have proved a means of drawing many who could not be prevailed upon to go to the Church or upper room, and have continued at the Coenties Slip Station a strong feature of the work.

Many have been the branches of work reaching out in various directions. The Society has organized three Mission Stations, each with its own Missionary, assisted by colporteurs and sextons in visiting the ships and bringing seamen to the services. At each station is a reading room open daily, where books and papers, instructive lectures, and friendly interest are constant influences for keeping the men from temptation.

The Sailors' boarding house in Franklin Square, continued its important work until within this last year, when the old quarters proving less desirable as regards location, it was deemed advisable to sell the property and a new Home was purchased at 52 Market Street, and thoroughly equipped for a larger field of work.

The Sunday-schools connected with the work are in active operation, and the Missionaries' Reports continue to show new members, and increased usefulness in all the branches of the work.

Owing to a generous bequest by the late William H. Vanderbilt, the station on the North River in 1888, became the possessor of a beautiful church building and parsonage attached, and ample accommodations for missionary work.

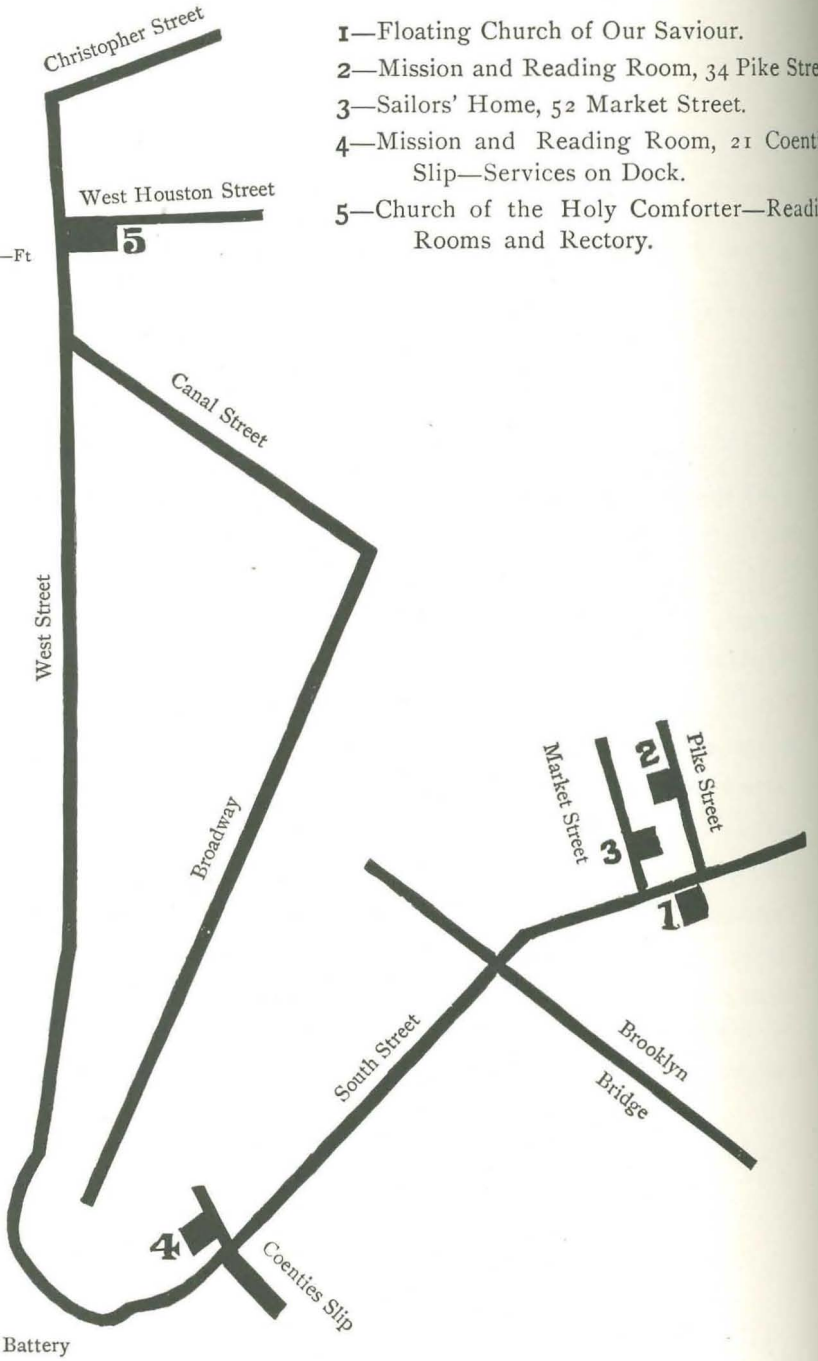
To illustrate the belief in the good accomplished by the Society, we mention an interesting occurrence which happened this last year, when one of the heirs of an estate, in furtherance of his father's bequest, voluntarily turned over to the Society a sum of money which the Courts had decided

belonged to him, because of the invalidity of one of the provisions of the will.

Looking back over the fifty years of the Society's life, we may on this anniversary recall from the long roll of those who have been prominent in forwarding the work, the names of Parker, Roberts, and Walker, our faithful Missionaries for many years; and among the Managers those of Halsey, Benedict, Swords, Underhill, Ely, Fisher, Proal, Kummel, Tracey, Warburton, Whitlock, Churchill, Journeay, Briggs, Brown, Foster and the one so recently taken from us, Geo. E. Shortridge.

Year by year the appeals for aid and interest have gone forth and been nobly responded to. Once again we come to you, our friends, with this cause which is not only ours, but yours. We have tried to show how the help given in these past years has been considered a sacred trust, and has been employed as far as human judgment could decide to the fullest carrying out of the great principle of Christian Love and Brotherhood. Mere statistics can less fitly represent the actual results in this line of work than in others. Coming and going as the seamen so constantly do, it is almost impossible to formulate accomplishment of good done, but there is enough of certainty to give impulse to continued effort. The Easter-tide has brought again its lesson of life from death, and helps us to make the spirit of our work, that of rescuing from the death of sin, and opening up the life of Christian effort to this brave but sorely tempted class on whom we are so dependent for the obtaining of our daily comforts and necessities.

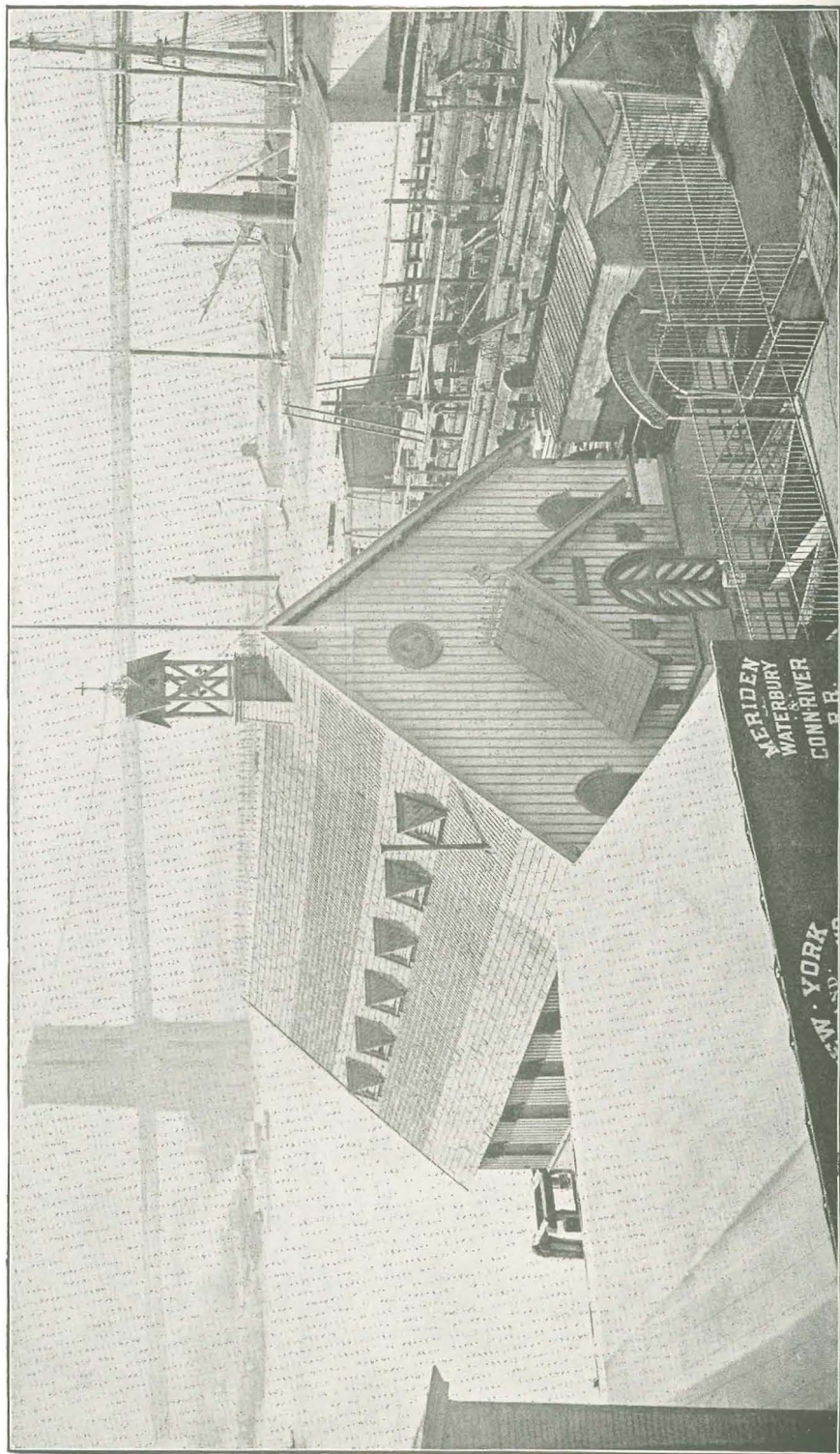

Report of the Missionary

IN CHARGE OF THE

“Floating Church of Our Saviour.”

Statistical information concerning our past year's work is herewith presented, indicating healthy life and growth. Some one has said that “by statistics you can prove anything but the truth,” yet, so far as a showing of results, we can point to little else than these figures. Primarily, our mission is to seamen. Jack is a wayfarer. We welcome him, a few days at a time in the midst of his voyaging to and fro, and make him at home within uplifting influences. Our seed is verily “cast upon the waters.” Our congregation is indeed a floating one, with scant opportunity for organization or permanence in social contact. Hence the church that we build is one that is being continually scattered abroad. Little chance in this peculiar work for trumpet-blowing or wearing the garlands. We have our best encouragement in the sure evidence that when our sailor brethren come into port they are more and more looking to us for a church and social home, the affectionate regard which is shown for the place by those who are far away, and the increasing number of men who date their salvation from the day on which they reached our doors.

The sailors like us. Here is their church, proclaiming the gospel tidings and extending a helping hand; their club rooms affording rest, recreation and good fellowship; all freely offered in Christ's name, without making religion an imported drug to be taken on certain occasions, but like the broad, shining sun—indispensable and natural—permeating all things with light and hope.

So long as the work of this Society continues, no sailor need come into port without a warm home welcome, brotherly help in time of need, and fresh courage for other voyages.

It is big pay, and glory enough for modest men, to know that we are thus engaged in sustaining the church's work of redemption amid the seething mass of our dock-town iniquities.

The different parts of our work have moved on in their usual way, developing such an increased attendance of seamen at the services, lectures and entertainments, as to emphasize each year's repeated demand for more spacious lecture and reading rooms. We are congratulating ourselves upon

seeing this want supplied before another winter, as our executive committee have taken the matter into consideration.

Invalid or destitute mariners, and those dependent on them, who have been left destitute by their death, to the number of seventy-five, have received aid from the Morrill Fund ; and we have helped one hundred and twenty-five other poor from donations received for that purpose.

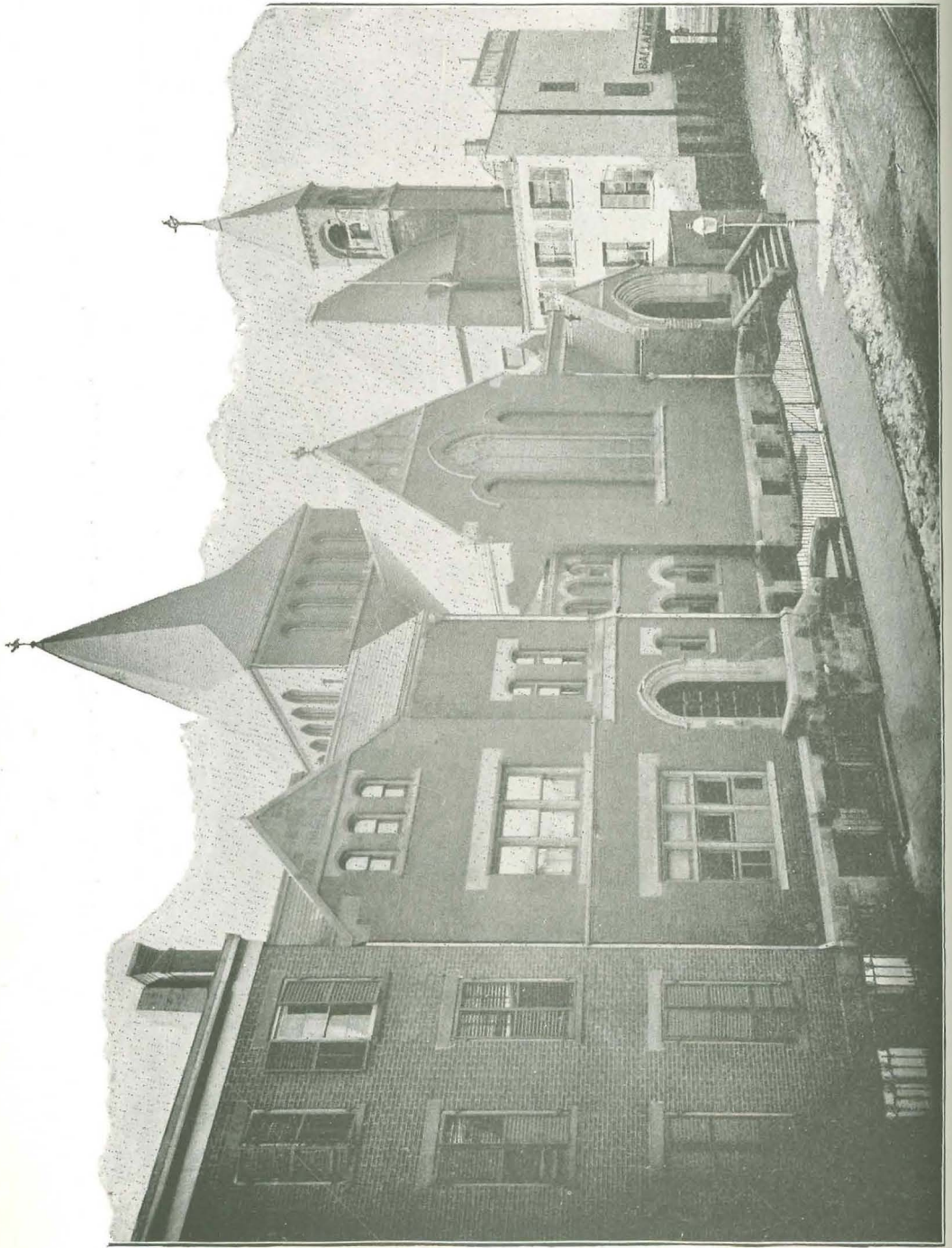

Report of the Missionary

IN CHARGE OF THE

“Church of the Holy Comforter.”

The close of another year again brings before the Board of Managers the Annual Report of the Minister in charge of the Church of the Holy Comforter and Reading Rooms at the North River Station.

And it is with unfeigned gratitude to the “Author and Finisher of every good work” that by divine providence he has been enabled by good health to meet every appointment throughout the year, for the physical, moral and spiritual improvement of *seamen* and others placed under his care. And I wish to emphasize the spiritual uplift that our church services have proved *to all* who have attended them this past year.

New methods have been tried, and with good results. We have made a greater use of our church.

Three special Christmas services for seamen were held in the church on the Tuesday evenings of December 26th, January 2d and 9th. The number of persons present at these services was 682, and of seamen, 482.

A third service on Sunday evenings has given us an average attendance of about one hundred persons.

Five illustrated lectures, with the use of the stereopticon, on the subject of the “Earthly Footprints of our Lord,” on the Tuesday evenings of Lent, have called forth loud expressions of gratitude from the seamen for the help these pictures of light upon our Lord’s life have been to them. Between four and five hundred seamen have attended these lectures.

I cannot emphasize too strongly the important work that is being accomplished through the instrumentality of our Reading Rooms. The improvements made last fall, which gave us more space, light, heat, the good cheer and hearty welcome, the spirit of brotherly kindness that we are trying to manifest to all men, the variety of reading matter, games, the best music and entertainments within our reach, the post-office now established, these are some of the helps which have led to the statistics for the year, and have increased our Friday evening services in the Church to double the attendance. And the forward movement which is going on in the temperance work is having its good effects along this entire river front.

The Sunday and Sewing Schools are both in a flourishing condition.

Sick and destitute seamen have been helped through the Morrill Fund and the Church Hospital and Dispensary.

I wish to tender my personal thanks to those members of the Board of Managers and others for the contributions which have made the Christmas, the Tuesday evening entertainments, and the poor fund, which has been such a help through this very trying winter. The individual amounts will show in the report of donations. I wish also to thank those friends who have contributed some fifty packages of reading matter.

May God bless and prosper all who are interested in our seamen's welfare.

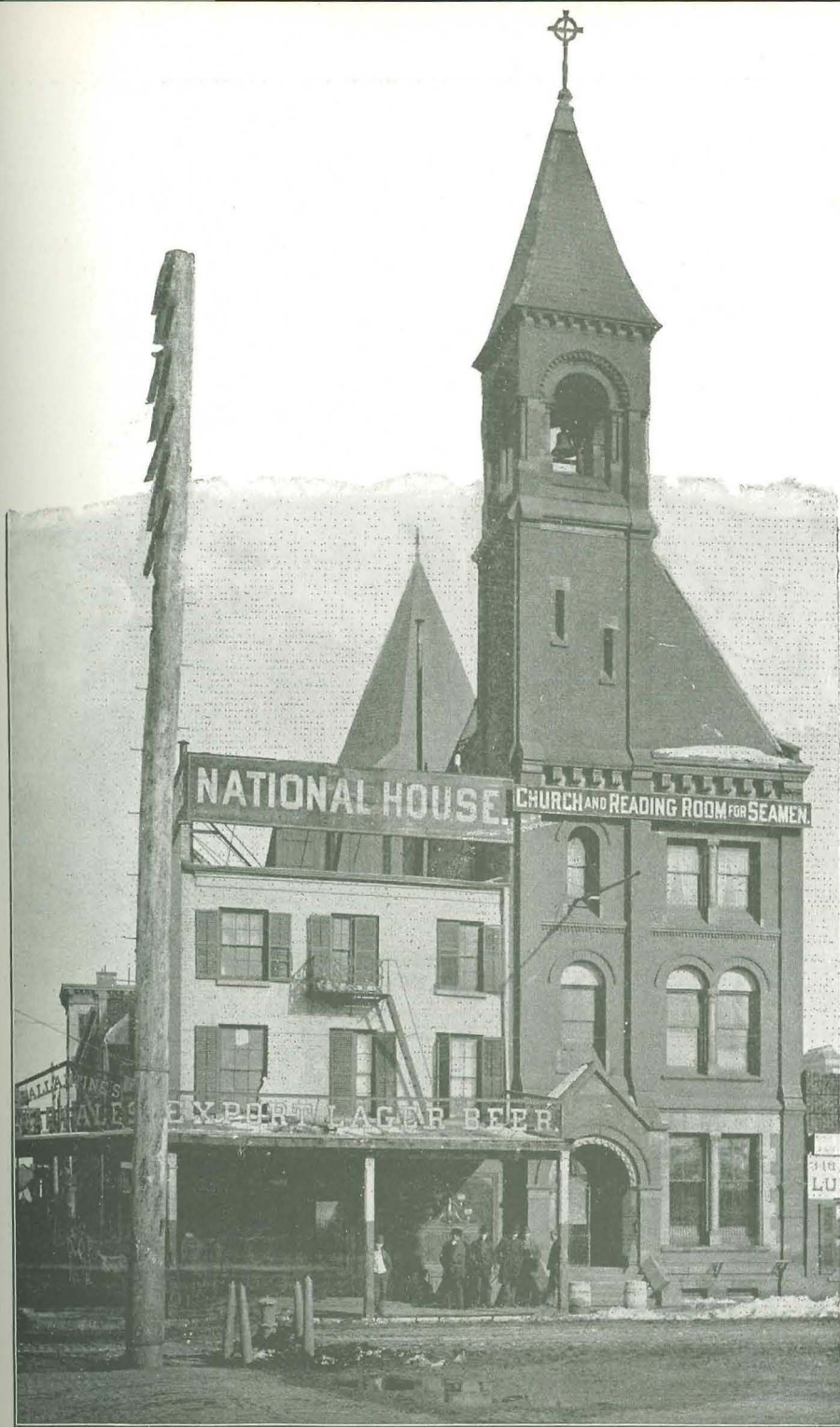

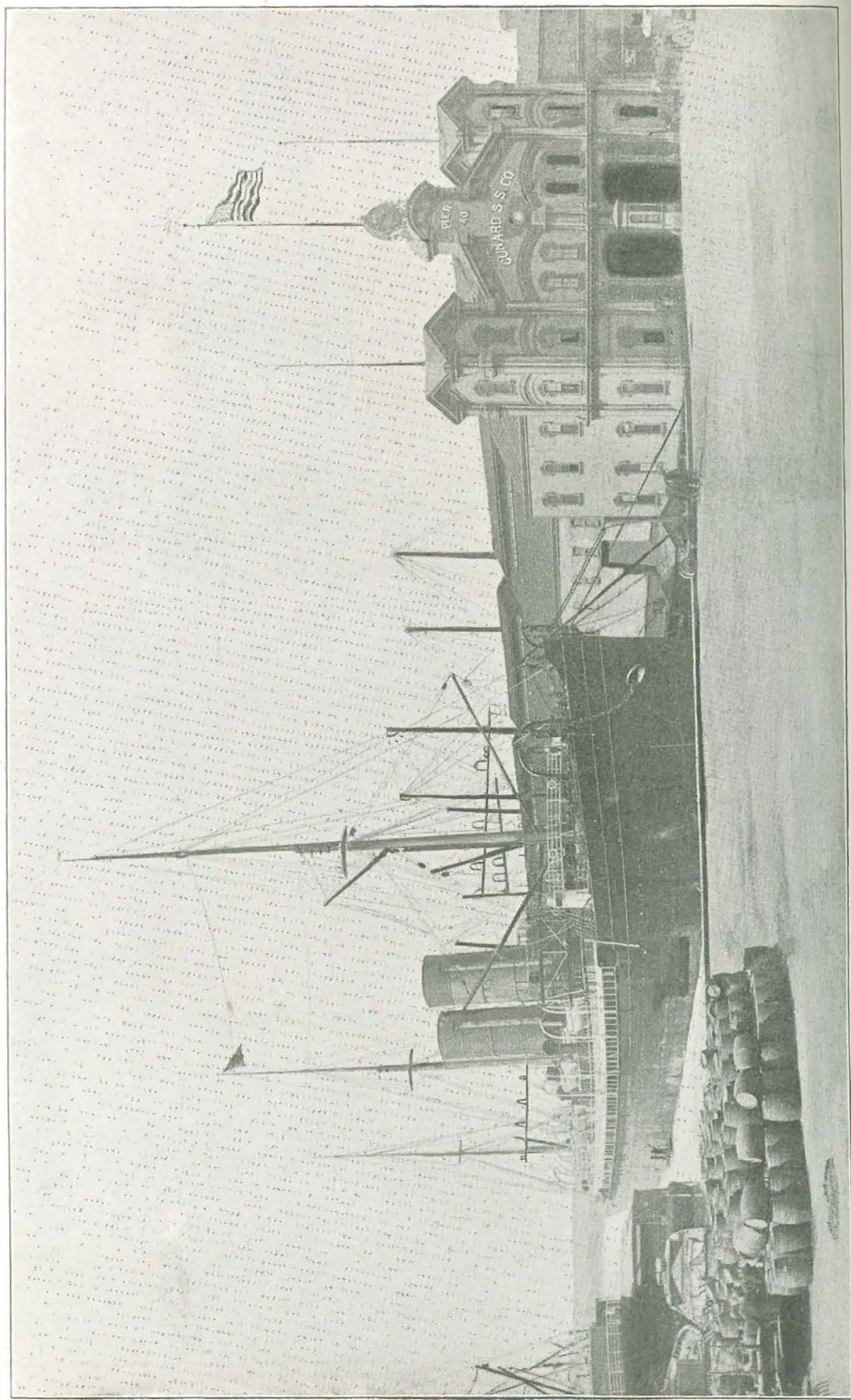

Annual Report

OF THE

Missionary of Coenties Slip Station.

The governing purpose of the Seamen's Society is to bring the influences of the Gospel to bear upon the hearts and to build up the character of the men of the sea, and for the efficient attainment of this object to provide them with mission churches specially their own, in which they will feel themselves at home and take a lawful pride.

During the many years the Missionary of this station has labored for the Society, the need of a church edifice has been deeply lamented, as it has impaired the more permanent work of the Society in that part of the Port where so much good might be accomplished. In summer, at open air services, and in winter, in the mission room, his ardent desire has been to carry out the purpose and objects of the Society; and to do this on the basis of the Church's well-known principles, a consecrated building is imperatively demanded.

When the services are conducted upon the Pier, we have congregations numbering upwards of two hundred persons. We have no difficulty in finding seats for those who are then present, as the benches which are ranged under the tent, and the string-pieces of the Pier afford sufficient seating capacity for the whole, or the greater part, of all who remain to the close of the services; but this cannot be said of the accommodations in the mission-room when cold weather compels us to retire to its shelter. It is sometimes uncomfortably filled. When part of the congregation is seated on benches without backs they, of course, feel much physical discomfort.

Your Missionary has been patiently waiting and praying for many years that God would move the hearts of his faithful people to provide us with more spacious and suitable quarters for the dissemination of His truth in this obscure and almost unknown part of His vineyard. Earnestly indeed does he desire to see the work of this Station placed upon a more solid and permanent basis, being persuaded that there is room for more extended effort and enlarged work if the necessary instrumentalities were once put in motion.

Every occasion upon which your Missionary celebrates the Holy Communion there seems to be a striking incongruity in all the surroundings,

almost verging on a profanation of the most sacred institution of the Gospel. Here also, the writer would most respectfully urge upon the consideration of the Board of Managers the necessity of larger accommodations for the sailors and boatmen who visit the Reading-room during the day, and for the Women's Social Club, which meets once a week. The capacity of the room, as tested so often during the past winter, is entirely inadequate to our needs. It has been repeatedly over-crowded; yea, I think we may truthfully say that it has been literally packed. On one occasion, when the Club gave an entertainment, there were 220 persons within the walls. The area of the room is about seven hundred square feet. The Club was organized last December. It has proved to be more than a success. It is a surprise. It commenced with ten or twelve, and now has grown to "ten times ten." The attendance is composed exclusively of the wives and daughters of the boatmen whose boats are laid up in the Harbor throughout the winter. The orderly, respectable and interested company which assembles at these meetings is convincing evidence of the intelligence, urbanity and refinement of our boat people. The Club is presided over by a President who, with a few other associates, plan and carry out the entertainments of the evening. All the expense of the Club is borne by the members.

We have also a Men's Club, which meets every Thursday evening, where sailors and boatmen are welcome to spend a few hours in friendly conversation, innocent amusement, readings and recitations. At these meetings there is always served some light refreshments. The Club has been a source of unfeigned pleasure and profit to the many pilots, tug-boat hands, sailors and boatmen in the neighborhood of the Slip, and were it not for the privileges thus afforded they would be induced to seek associations in the saloons, which are always open and waiting to entice the stranger and the wayfarer. The average attendance during the winter has been about twenty-five at each weekly gathering.

The Missionary cannot close his report without thanking those gentlemen of the Board of Managers, whose donations, in answer to a special appeal, made Christmas tide so happy for those boatmen and their families who are in the habit of attending the services.

The death of the late Geo. E. Shortridge, Chairman of the Committee, which took place so suddenly and unexpectedly last month, has cast a gloom over the writer, and has produced a void in the working of the Committee that cannot easily or soon be filled. The want of his co-operation, wisdom and unflinching support of the Missionary is a loss for which there can be no amends.

Sailors' Home.

To the Board of Managers :

The Home at 338 Pearl Street having been sold to advantage and possession given May 1st, last year, the present home at 52 Market Street was only occupied by the Society, January 2d of this year ; hence the work for a period of only three months can be reported by your Committee.

The house has been thoroughly repaired, modern plumbing, etc., introduced, so that the Home, under the direct care of our Superintendent, Mr. Henry Smith, will compare favorably with the best seamen's lodging house in this city.

During the past winter seafaring men have been no better off than those engaged in other classes of labor. The hard times have been felt by them, and competition has been so keen that wages for an able-bodied seaman, in some cases, have been very low.

The Board will see that during the month of March the number of seamen shipped exceeds the combined totals of January and February, and the Committee are pleased to report that better times are being experienced in the shipping trade and that a slight advance in wages has taken place. Of the 153 mentioned above, 81 deposited money for their board on arriving, the same running from \$1.50 to \$150.00. Seventy-two arrived without money, and their board, lodging and petties were advanced by the Superintendent until they were shipped and he could get an advance on account of their wages, which advance in very few cases covered the amount of their indebtedness.
