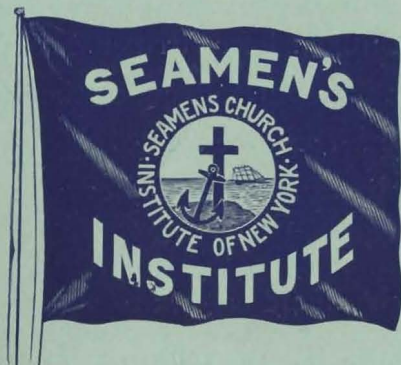

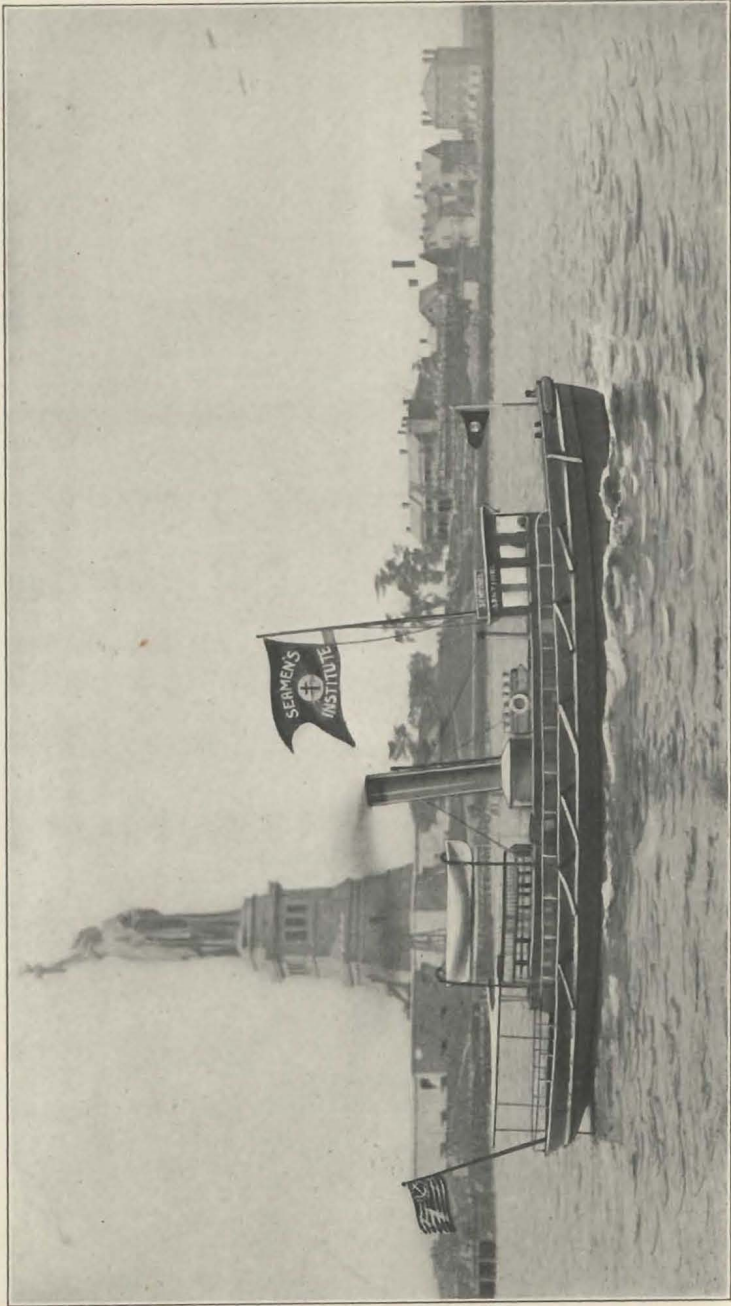

## Report of the Board of Managers.

**The Field.** Our Society enters upon its sixty-third year, with the most extended horizon in its long journey of usefulness. The outlook amply justifies redoubled efforts to make our Society, like our nation, world wide in its power for good. Out of the three million sailors toiling on the seven seas, the 250,000 seamen who frequent this port every year will carry with them to other ports the good and evil influences they assimilate here.

**The Work.** Our local work is described in the general summary and in the synopsis of station reports. Our aim is first to give religious privileges, then rational entertainment and attractive environment to all seamen while on shore, police and social protection from the evils that beset them, prompt collection of wages due them and punishment for those who abuse them.

To accomplish these objects our chaplains conduct religious services and give practical advice and assistance to those in need. We furnish a sailors' home, several reading rooms with ample facilities for home correspondence and for transmission of earnings to dependent relatives, concerts and lectures adapted to the needs of a floating population temporarily on shore, and cultivate personal and friendly relations with the 4,417 men who have attended our entertainments and with 25,601 men who have been present at our religious services.

Our sister organization, the Legal Aid Society, through its Seamen's Branch, at No. 1 Broadway, has taken appropriate action on 347 claims of seamen sent to it by this Society, in collecting their unpaid wages, damages for their cruel treatment, and in the general enforcement of laws for their protection.

**Change in Stations.** In furtherance of our plans for extension and consolidation we have opened a new sailor's home adequate for the accommodation of 120 men, in a district greatly frequented by seamen at the corner of Forman Street and Atlantic Avenue in Brooklyn, and which consists of four buildings equipped for the purpose. This property was purchased in part from the proceeds of the sale of the sailor's home in Market Street which had become too small for our purposes, in a territory no longer frequented by sailors. At this new station the work heretofore carried on in Market Street and at Bush Terminal Docks in Brooklyn will be consolidated and operated until the completion of the new proposed building at Coenties Slip and South Street.

**New Building.** Citizens of New York have already responded generously to our appeal for the larger Seamen's Institute referred to in our last report and which is to supply 500 men with separate sleeping rooms, captains and officers with club rooms, a restaurant supplying single meals or board by the day or week, a free shipping bureau, class-rooms for nautical instruction, reading, writing, game and baggage rooms, banking and post-office departments, and a large assembly hall for religious services, lectures and entertainments. The plot of land, about 90 feet square, at corner of Coenties Slip and South Street, has been bought at a cost of about \$200,000, all of which has been subscribed. At least three hundred thousand dollars more will be needed for construction and equipment.

This is a problem and a responsibility greater than has ever before been assumed by our Society, or by any like Society in New York. But it is the natural and logical development of our work. It is not too much to hope that New York, the first port of our country, will set an example to other ports. We are still far behind other large cities in their care for seamen. The commercial, maritime and civic interests of this magnificent metropolis, which leads the world in its generous and humane interest in men who labor and suffer on land, will not fail to complete this monumental work in aid of those who toil and ultimately perish on the sea.

And so we renew our appeal to all who are interested in this plan for the welfare of the sailor to send their subscriptions in aid of the new building to the Chairman of the Building Committee, which is composed of the following members of the Board :

**Our Free Shipping Bureau.** The number of seamen shipped without payment of illegal shipping fees and bonuses was, during the year from our Battery Station, 2,390, and from our North River Station 344, making a total of 2,734, while the Battery Station provided employment on ships to 1,208 men and the North River Station to 117 more, making a grand total of 4,059. By our protection and hospitality extended to the sailor on shore we have greatly lessened the vile traffic in human flesh of the crimps and criminal boardinghouse keepers. The opportunity to find men among an estimated 164,359 who visited our reading rooms and Sailors Home and most of whom desire shipment, has been availed of to such an extent by so large a number of captains seeking for crews that we have established a new department for the U. S. Auxiliary Station which now ships its men in this port wholly from our Battery Station.

The "Sentinel" has added greatly to the efficiency of our mission and practical work in this churchless harbor and has become indispensable in the recent enlargement of our scope by its 351 trips during the year and its transportation of an average of 249 seamen each month. The continued co-operation of the ladies who constitute the Seamen's Benefit Society in keeping this vessel in active work is gratefully acknowledged. Its average monthly cost for maintenance is about \$394.26 but its value is vastly greater. Of the annual cost of \$4,739.56 we have received \$1,000 from the said Society.

Our banking facilities at Battery Station have been availed of by very many sailors to the extent of \$116,810.76 for safe keeping and for transmission to their relatives at home.

**Legislation.**

Recent legislation and the activity of the Seamen's Branch of the Legal Aid Society have minimized crimes against seamen. Heavy fines have been inflicted upon boarding house keepers for extorting "blood money" for obtaining employment for sailors. Our committee on legislation is still endeavoring to obtain appropriate relief and protection for men employed on scows and barges, who are greatly exposed to needless disaster from lack of life-saving appliances, and to promote such revision of our navigation laws as will secure greater precaution and the general use of life-saving measures and appliances on all classes of vessels.

**Action of  
the  
General  
Convention.**

The General Convention, held this year at Richmond, Virginia, has manifested increasing interest in behalf of seamen. After hearing and considering the report made by the "Joint Commission upon work among seamen" appointed at the General Convention held in Boston in the year 1904, the following RESOLUTION was adopted :

"WHEREAS, This General Convention being held in Richmond, Va., in the year 1907, takes note of the 300th anniversary of the founding of Jamestown, and the bringing to this land of the Historic faith, which events could not have been consummated save by the labors and self-sacrifice of seamen.

And, WHEREAS, There are at present more than 177,000 seamen serving this country in the vessels of the *American Mercantile Marine* alone, not to mention the many thousands of foreign seamen visiting our ports for most of whom the church has not hitherto made spiritual or temporal provisions: therefore be it

RESOLVED : The House of Deputies concurring, that a Board to be known as "The Seamen's Church Institute of America" and to consist of five Bishops, five Presbyters and five Laymen, be and is hereby appointed a Board to manage the work of the church among seamen in the United States of America and its possessions, such Board to be organized by and to be under the direction of the Board of Missions."

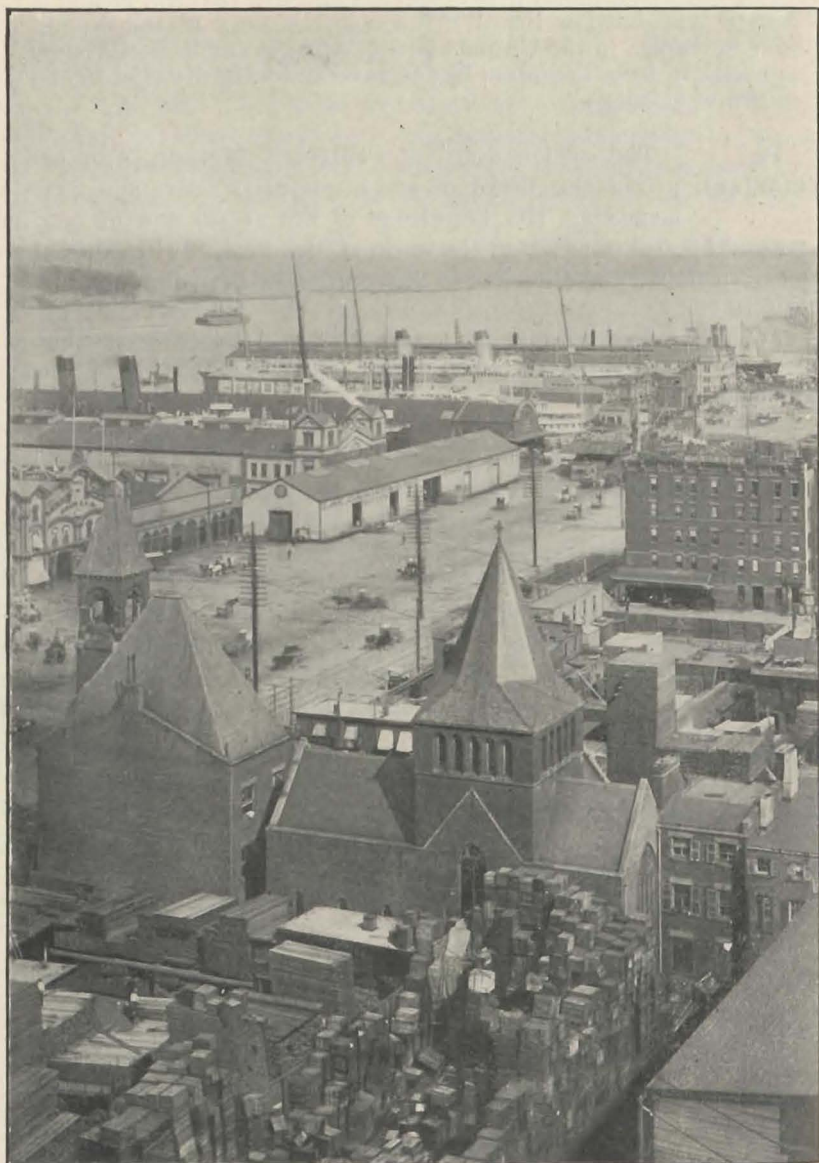
**In Memoriam.** The sudden death of Captain A. McLean Wait has deprived our Board of one of its most active and practical members. His knowledge of life at sea and of maritime affairs and his zeal in behalf of the work of the Society will cause him to be long remembered and his loss to be regretted by his colleagues.

**Legacies.** The Society has received during the past year but one legacy, that of the late Miss Amide Vogel Smith of the sum of \$1,000.00.

**Finances.** We have been compelled to draw from our trust funds \$16,000 toward making up the difference between our receipts for current expenses amounting to \$17,752.87 and the sum of \$35,186.68, which has been expended in the most economical manner consistent with the enlarged work of the Society.

It is with great regret and no little discouragement that we find ourselves year after year making inroads upon the fund which is our main source of support, yet curtailment of effort in the face of increasing work seems inadvisable and impossible unless we shirk our growing opportunity for usefulness.

## Report of Committee on Legislation.

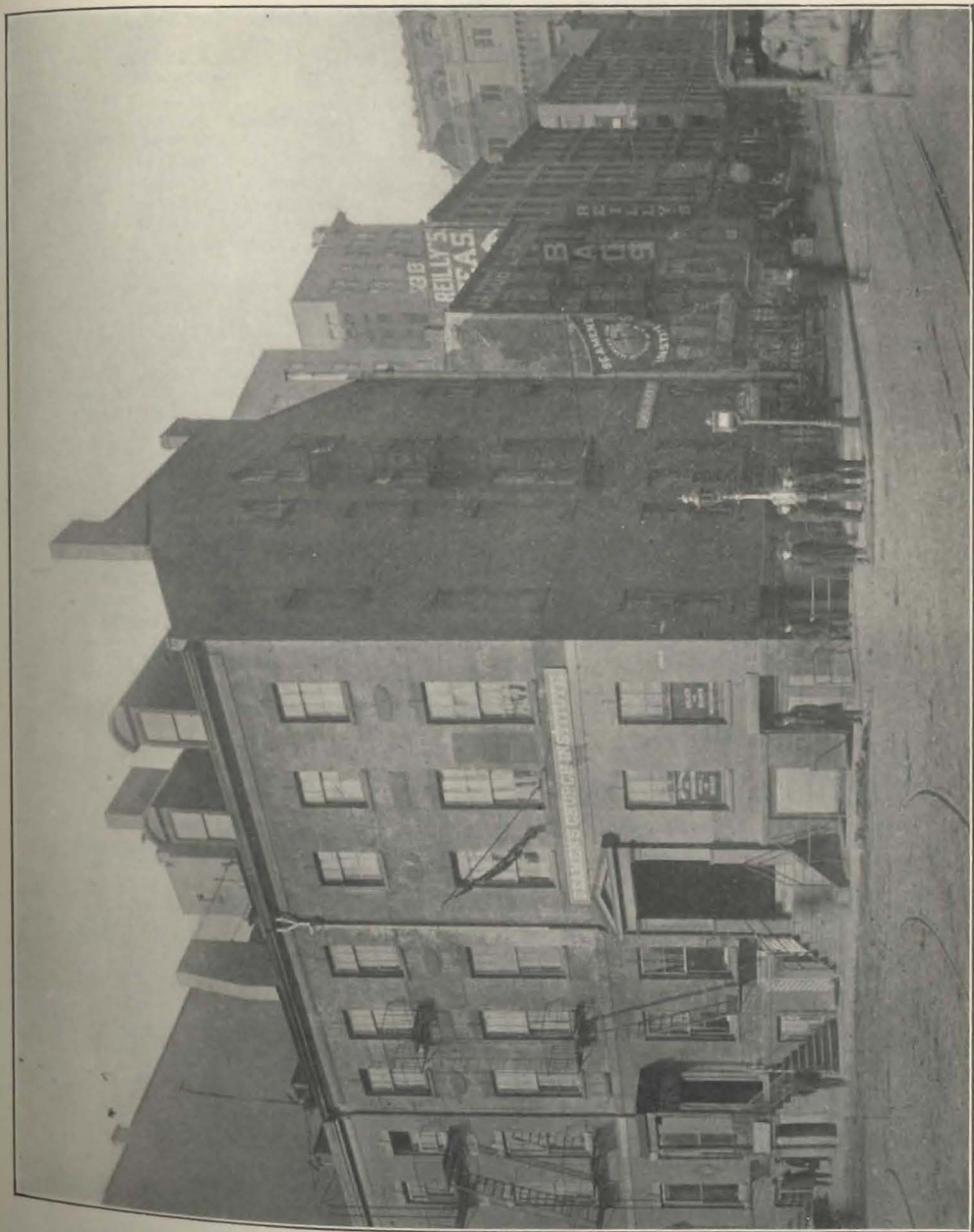
The Committee on Legislation has continued its efforts to bring before the public and the Department of Commerce and Labor the need of reducing the dangerous length of tows in the rivers and harbors and along the seacoast of the United States, and to require the use of life-saving appliances on all scows and barges, a class of vessels which has thus far had no guard-rails or life preservers or other means of saving their crews in case of disaster. An appeal will be made to Congress to require that masters and mates of all vessels of one hundred and fifty tons and upwards shall obtain a license from the U. S. Inspectors. Unfortunately this rule now applies only to vessels of seven hundred tons and upwards. It is believed that the proposed changes, if enacted, will add to the security of passengers and property at sea. This Committee has been represented at many conferences with organizations interested in maritime affairs for these purposes, and it is hoped that the next Congress will take effective action for the removal of many serious dangers to navigation.

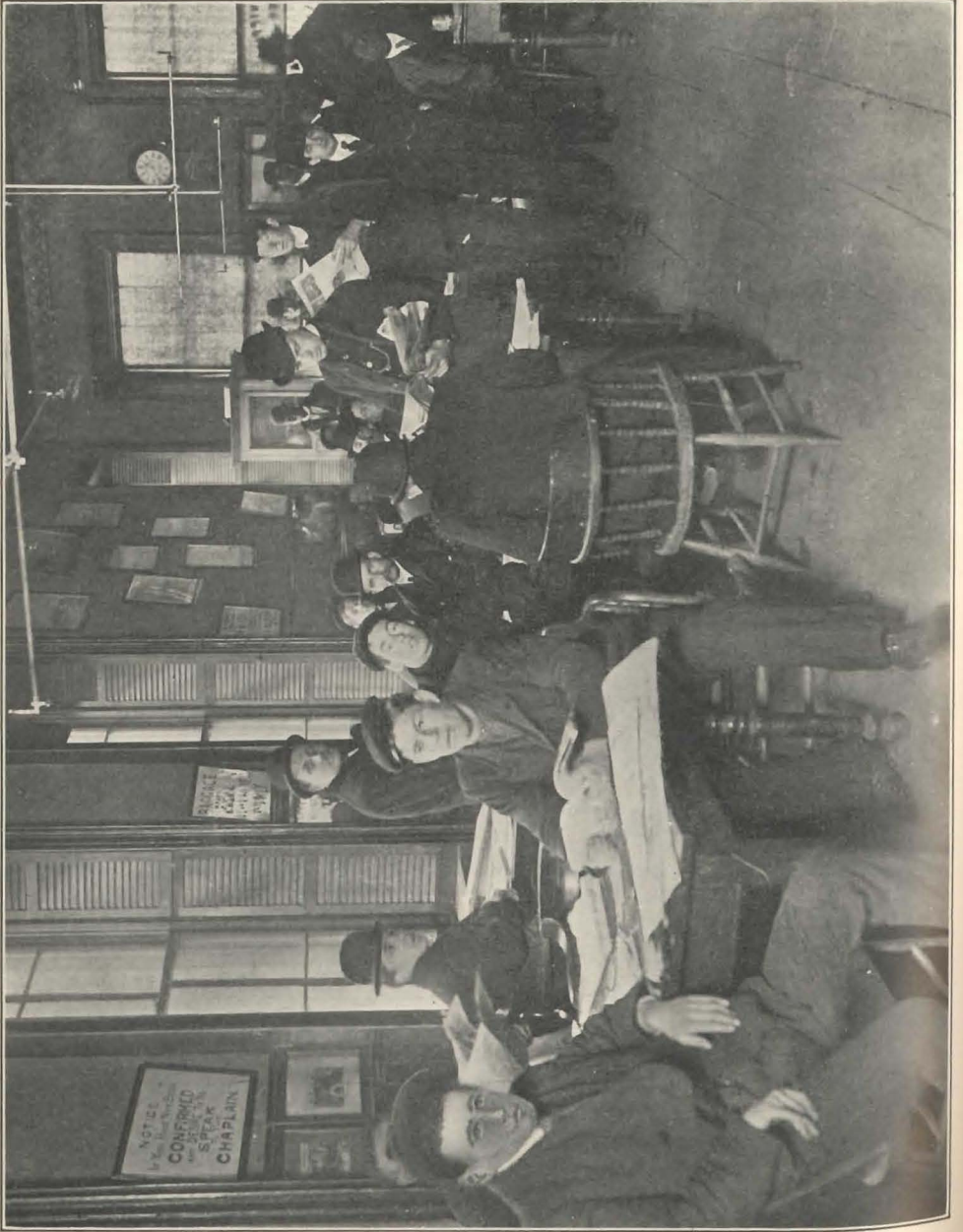
